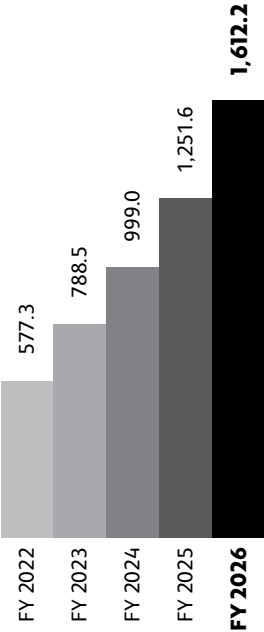

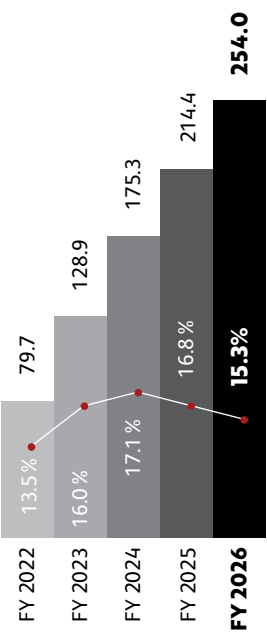

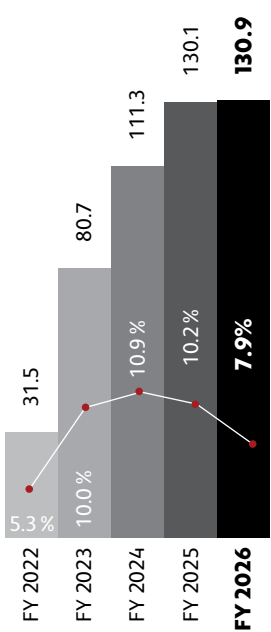
EBITDA AND EBITDA MARGIN

■ EBITDA — EBITDA margin



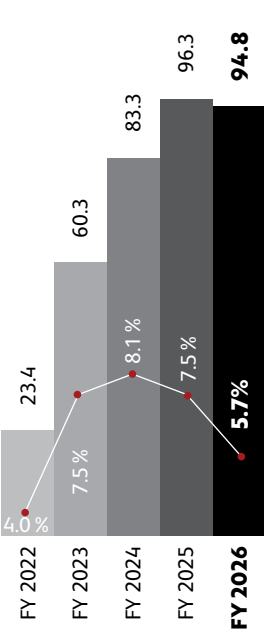
PBT AND PBT MARGIN

■ PBT — PBT margin

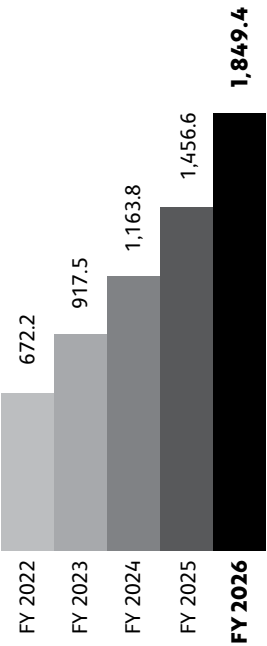


PAT AND PAT MARGIN

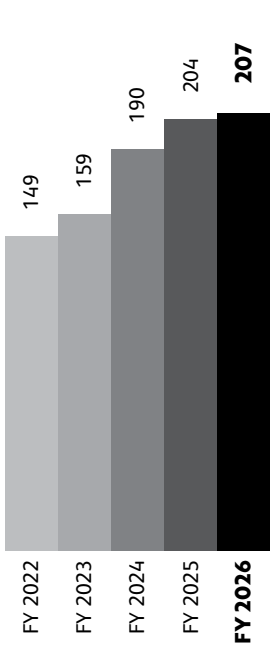

TIMELESS CRAFT AND A TIMELY MARKET

Dear Shareholders,

It is my privilege to present the Annual Report of Ethos Limited for the financial year 2025-26 - a year that, in every sense, mattered. I share it with genuine pride: a year in which Ethos not only navigated a complex global landscape but turned it to advantage, widening our lead as India's foremost destination for luxury and premium watches. By almost any measure, this was a landmark year. Standalone total income grew by close to 30 % to ₹1,653 Crore; profitability remained resilient even against a record appreciation in the Swiss Franc and the front-loaded costs of an accelerated expansion; and a successful rights issue has left our balance sheet stronger than at almost any point in our history.

A market coming of age

India's relationship with the fine watch has fundamentally shifted. What was once an occasional indulgence is fast becoming an enduring passion - and, increasingly, a considered investment. A swelling base of high-net-worth individuals, a confident and discerning younger consumer, and a deepening appreciation for craftsmanship have together made India one of the fastest-growing watch markets anywhere in the world. Swiss watch exports to India

have grown from CHF 219 million in 2023 to CHF 296 million in 2025 — a rise of around 35 % in just two years — and India now ranks among the top twenty export markets for Swiss watches worldwide. The coming into force of the India-EFTA Trade and Economic Partnership Agreement adds further momentum: import duties on Swiss watches, historically 22 %, have already been reduced to 15.71 % with effect from January 2026 and are set to reduce progressively to zero by 2031 - opening the door to a far wider range of brands entering India and ultimately deepening the breadth and quality of choice available to Indian consumers. Our response to this opportunity has been deliberate in its sequencing. We built our foundation in the luxury segment - a business rooted in trust, relationships and experience - and are now extending thoughtfully into the premium and luxury lifestyle segments beyond watches, widening our reach across price points and product lines while remaining true to our core positioning. It is a strategy designed not for a single season, but for enduring leadership.

Purpose beyond profit

The measure of a Company lies not only in what it earns, but in what it gives back. Through the Million Tree Project, undertaken

with respected partner organisations, and our wider community efforts, we seek to leave a lasting and positive imprint on the society we are part of. Our people sit at the heart of this purpose. A diverse and inclusive workplace, and sustained investment in the development of our teams, is for us a matter of conviction rather than convention — for the experience we promise our customers can only ever be as good as the people who bring it to life. Sound governance, responsible growth, and care for the communities and environment around us are not adjacent to our strategy; they are part of how we intend to build a Company that endures. To our customers, our colleagues, our brand partners, and you, our shareholders — thank you for walking this journey with us. A timeless craft has met a market whose moment has truly come; and Ethos intends to make the very most of it.

TURNING A TIMELY MARKET INTO LASTING SCALE

Dear Shareholders,

A year ago, much of what I will describe was ambition. Today it is infrastructure - boutiques opened, verticals carved out, a balance sheet recapitalised. FY 2025-26 was the year Ethos turned intent into capacity, and capacity into results.

A landmark year, by the numbers

FY 2025-26 was, by almost any measure, the strongest year in our history. Standalone total income rose around 30% to ₹1,653 crore, driven by a deliberate shift towards the luxury and high-luxury end of our portfolio, a higher average selling price of ₹2.07 lakh, and a fast-maturing pre-owned business — three forces that converged to powerful effect. Despite a record appreciation in the Swiss Franc and the front-loaded costs of our accelerated boutique expansion, profitability held firm: consolidated EBITDA grew to ₹254 crore and profit after tax stood at ₹95 crore. The capital raised through our rights issue during the year has strengthened the balance sheet and given us the financial capacity to keep investing with conviction.

We closed the year with 94 boutiques across 30 cities, up from 73 across 26 cities a year earlier - and have since grown to 103 across 34 cities as on date, entering eight new markets — Ranchi, Jodhpur, Srinagar, Kanpur, Agra, Faridabad, Visakhapatnam and Amritsar - each one an invitation into a world of craftsmanship few other retailers in the country can offer. With 64 brands available exclusively at Ethos, our portfolio is anchored by a differentiation that competitors cannot replicate — exclusivity that deepens customer loyalty, elevates average selling prices, and positions Ethos as the definitive gateway for the world's finest watchmaking in India.

The year we built for scale

The most significant milestone of the year was the City of Time in Gurugram — a 22,000-square-foot luxury watch destination housing nine boutiques: seven exclusive

mono-brand boutiques and two multi-brand galleries showcasing over fifty independent watch brands under one roof. It is far more than a store; it is a statement of where we believe Indian luxury retail is headed.

This shift towards larger, more experiential formats is deliberate. Increasingly, our boutiques are destinations in their own right — our ~8,000 sq. ft. boutique in Jaipur, the largest luxury watch store in Rajasthan, and our two-storey, 6,000 sq. ft. Summit boutique in Kochi are designed not simply to display watches, but to immerse the customer in them: private consultations, curated brand environments, watchmaking zones and lounges where time is meant to slow down. It reflects a simple conviction — that at Ethos, a watch is never merely a purchase; it is an experience. But scale, for us, is not measured in square footage alone — it is about building distinct engines of growth across the business.

Our certified pre-owned vertical continued to gain both credibility and scale, emerging as a sustainable, aspirational gateway into fine watchmaking and one of our fastest-growing businesses. Our lifestyle vertical — anchored by Messika in fine jewellery and Rimowa in luxury luggage — was reorganised under a dedicated subsidiary, Ethos Lifestyle Private Limited, to give it sharper strategic focus; during the year we opened India's first Messika boutique, extending our reach well beyond watches. We are at an advanced stage with several global brands not yet present in India - and will partner only where we can secure exclusivity, so we can invest behind each for the long term.

Our people, our execution engine

None of this happens without the people who bring it to life. In luxury retail, our people are the experience. We have invested in a robust training vertical so our teams are better equipped to engage customers and deliver a superior experience; made our digital marketing significantly more data-driven; and are leveraging technology

across inventory and operations to create a seamless, omnichannel journey. What we are building is not merely a retail network, but a differentiated and future-ready retail ecosystem.

The priorities ahead

The opportunity before us is substantial, and our priorities for the year ahead are clear. We will widen our roster of exclusive brands across watches and adjacent luxury categories; sharpen our omnichannel and digital experience around the customer; carry our presence deeper into Tier 2 and Tier 3 India; scale our pre-owned and build out our service network — all while holding ourselves to the highest standards of responsible and sustainable business.

The road to 10x

Our ambition remains unchanged and undimmed: to grow the business tenfold within a decade of our listing — reaching our 10x goal by 2032. The foundation is now firmly in place: in our brand relationships, our retail network, our maturing pre-owned and lifestyle verticals, and above all in our people. The path from here calls for ambition and discipline in equal measure and I have every confidence that Ethos will continue to convert this rare market moment into durable, responsible, long-term value.

To our brand partners, whose craftsmanship we are privileged to represent; to my colleagues across Ethos, whose effort turns strategy into experience; and to you, our shareholders, for your continued trust — thank you. The market's moment has come — and we intend not merely to participate in India's luxury growth story, but to help shape it.

2. Results of operations and the state of Company's affairs

The financial year 2025-26 has been very successful for Ethos Limited, with substantial growth in both revenue and profitability. This achievement can be attributed to its focussed marketing efforts, innovative digital initiatives, supported by robustly growing economy and consumer sentiments.

During the year, Ethos Limited expanded its retail footprint by opening 21 new stores. Consequently, the Company's total store count increased from 73 to 94 stores.

Further strengthening its presence, the Company opened 6 additional stores by May 2026 and achieved the significant milestone of operating 100 boutiques across India.

The Company also expanded its presence into 4 cities (Jodhpur, Kanpur, Ranchi, Srinagar) increasing its reach to a total of 30 cities till March, 2026.

On a standalone basis, Ethos Limited's revenue from operations and other income for FY 2025-26 exhibited an impressive growth rate of 29.5%, amounting to ₹ 1,653.12 Cr. Similarly, on a consolidated basis, it achieved a growth rate of 29.98%, reaching ₹1,658.41 Cr.

In terms of net profit after tax (PAT), Ethos Limited's standalone performance for FY 2025-26 was remarkable, with ₹ 94.92 Cr. On a consolidated basis, its net profit after tax (PAT) for FY 2025-26 amounted to ₹ 96.14 Cr. Ethos Limited has successfully harnessed its digital capabilities to cater to consumer demand,

recognising the growing importance of online lead sales. With the outreach of the digital channel accounting for 32.7% of its billings, Ethos leverage the fact that a significant number of customers prefer to research and enquire about luxury watches using digital platforms. Moving forward, it will continue to innovate and allocate resources to digital marketing, combined with superb in store experience ensuring sustained engagement with its customer base. Overall, Ethos's remarkable performance in FY 2025-26, driven by its strategic initiatives, positions it well for sustained growth and success.

3. Dividend

In order to conserve profits of the current year for the several growth initiatives that the Company is pursuing, the Board of Directors do not propose dividend for current financial year. Pursuant to the requirements of SEBI Listing Regulations, Dividend Policy of the Company has been uploaded on the website of the Company and can be accessed at https://www.ethoswatches.com/investors-information/download/policies/Dividend_Policy.pdf

4. Transfer to General Reserve

As permitted under the provisions of the Companies Act, 2013, (the Act) the Board does not propose to transfer any amount to general reserve and has decided to retain the entire amount of profit for the Financial Year 2025-26 in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

5. Share Capital

Authorised Share Capital

The authorized share capital of the Company is ₹ 61,40,00,120 (Rupees Sixty-One Crores Forty Lakhs One Hundred and Twenty only) divided into 3,07,00,000 Equity shares of ₹ 10 each; 5,76,924 14% cumulative compulsory convertible preference shares of ₹130 each; 12,00,000 12% cumulative redeemable preference shares of ₹110 each; 10,00,000 12% non-cumulative redeemable preference shares of ₹100 each.

Paid-up Share Capital

The Paid-up Equity Share Capital of the Company as on March 31, 2026, is ₹26,75,76,930 (Rupees Twenty-Six Crores Seventy-Five Lakhs Seventy-Six Thousand Nine Hundred and Thirty Only) divided into 2,67,57,693 equity shares of ₹ 10 each.

6. Rights Issue

During the financial year 2025–26, the Board of Directors, at its meeting held on June 3, 2025, approved the raising of funds through a Rights Issue. Pursuant thereto, the Company successfully completed a Rights Issue comprising 22,77,250 equity shares of face value ₹10 each at an issue price of ₹1,800 per equity share (including a securities premium of ₹1,790 per equity share), aggregating to ₹409,90,50,000 (Rupees Four Hundred and Nine Crores Ninety Lakhs Fifty Thousand only).

The Rights Issue was undertaken to (i) fund the working capital requirements of the Company; and (ii) meet general corporate purposes. The Rights Equity Shares were offered to the eligible equity shareholders in the ratio of 4 (Four) Rights Equity Shares for every 43 (Forty Three) fully paid-up equity shares held by them as on the Record Date, i.e., June 12, 2025.

The Rights Issue opened on June 20, 2025 and closed on July 3, 2025. Pursuant to the basis of allotment approved by the designated stock exchange, the Rights Equity Shares were allotted on July 4, 2025 and were listed and admitted to trading on BSE Limited and the National Stock Exchange of India Limited with effect from July 8, 2025. The Rights Equity Shares rank pari passu in all respects with the existing equity shares of the Company, including with respect to dividend and other corporate benefits.

KFin Technologies Limited acted as the Registrar to the Issue and CRISIL Limited was appointed as the Monitoring Agency in accordance with the applicable provisions of the SEBI (Issue of Capital and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2018.

7. Material changes and commitment, if any, affecting the financial position of the Company between the end of the Financial Year and Date of Report

There have been no material changes or commitments affecting the financial position of the Company between the end of the financial year and the date of this report.

8. Details of significant and material orders passed by the regulators, courts and tribunals

There were no significant and material orders passed by the regulators or courts or tribunals impacting the going concern status and the Company's operations in future.

9. Proceedings under Insolvency and Bankruptcy Code, 2016

During the year under review, there were no proceedings that were filed by the Company or against the Company, which are pending under the Insolvency and Bankruptcy Code, 2016, as amended, before National Company Law Tribunal or other Courts.

10. Particulars of loans, guarantees or investments made under Section 186 of the Companies Act, 2013

The Company has neither advanced any loans nor given guarantees in terms of provisions of Section 186 of the Companies Act, 2013 during the year under review.

During the year, the Company has incorporated a Wholly Owned Subsidiary in the name of Ficus Trading LLC and invested an amount of ₹ 69,87,000 (Rupees Sixty-Nine Lakh Eighty-Seven Thousand only) in the Initial paid up capital of the Company by subscribing to 300 shares of AED 1000 each.

The Company has incorporated a Subsidiary in the name of Micron Watch Services Private Limited and invested an amount of ₹ 5,01,000 (Rupees Five Lakh One Thousand only) in the Initial paid up capital of the Company by subscribing to 50,100 shares of ₹ 10 each.

11. Internal Financial Controls (IFC) and their adequacy

The Company maintains adequate internal control systems, policies and procedures for ensuring orderly and efficient conduct of the business, including adherence to the Company's policies, safeguard of its assets, prevention and detection of frauds and errors, accuracy and completeness of the accounting records and timely preparation of reliable financial disclosures in all areas of its operations. The services of internal and external auditors are sought from time to time as well as in-house expertise and resources. The Company believes that it has sound internal control systems commensurate with the nature and size of its business. The Company continuously upgrades these systems in line with best-in-class practices.

These reports and deviations are regularly discussed with the Management and actions are taken, whenever necessary. The Audit Committee of the Board periodically reviews the adequacy of the internal control systems.

12. Board Meetings

During the financial year under review, Nine Board meetings were held. The details of dates of the above meetings including

the attendance of the Directors are given in the Corporate Governance Report which forms part of this Annual Report.

13. Audit Committee and other Board Committees

The various Committees of the Board focus on certain specific areas as per their terms of reference and scope. As such, these Committees take informed decisions in line with the delegated authority. The Committee is responsible for monitoring and reviewing the risk management plan and ensuring its effectiveness. The Audit Committee has additional oversight in the area of financial risks and controls. The major risks identified by the businesses and functions are systematically addressed through mitigating actions on a continuing basis.

During the year under review, it has reported revenue from operations amounting to ₹ 5.52 Cr and its net profit stood at ₹ 0.66 Cr.

Ficus Trading LLC ('Ficus') - Ficus is a wholly owned subsidiary body corporate of the Company and is engaged in the business of trading of Watches, Clocks & Spare Parts. It was incorporated in April 2025, to expand the Company's presence in international markets, particularly in the GCC region. The business is aligned with the main line of business of the Company. During the year under review, it has reported revenue from operations amounting to ₹ 2.57 Cr and its net profit stood at ₹ 0.25 Cr.

Ethos Lifestyle Private Limited previously known as RF Brands Private Limited ('Ethos Lifestyle') – Ethos Lifestyle is a Subsidiary Company and is engaged in the business of distribution of Jewellery, Handbags, Luggage and other Lifestyle & Fashion Products. During the year under review, it has reported revenue from operations amounting to ₹ 20.23 Cr and its net profit stood at ₹ 5.51 Cr.

Micron Watch Service Private Limited ('Micron') - Micron is a Joint Venture (Subsidiary) of the Company and is engaged in the business of Watch services and repair. It was incorporated in August 2025. During the year under review, it has not reported any revenue from operations and its net loss stood at ₹ 64,771.

Pasadena Retail Private Limited ('Pasadena') - Pasadena is a Joint Venture of the Company and is engaged in the business of retail of watches and rendering of related after sale services. During the year under review, it has reported revenue from operations amounting to ₹ 12.64 Cr. and its net loss stood at ₹ 0.49 Cr.

Silvercity Brands AG ('Silvercity') – Silvercity is an associate body corporate of the Company and is engaged in the business of acquisition and sale, holding and management of Intellectual property rights and license rights, especially in the watch industry and related areas; buying and selling, marketing and development of watches, related products and others luxury goods; it also provides services in these areas. None of the Director has received any remuneration or commission from any of the Company's subsidiaries or joint ventures. During the year under review, the Non-Executive Directors (NEDs) of the Company had no pecuniary relationship or transactions with the Company except for the sitting fees, received by them for attending Board and Committee meetings, held from time to time.

(b) Key Managerial Personnel :-

During the year under review, the following change took place in the Key Managerial Personnel of the Company:

Mr. Mukul Krishan Khanna resigned as the Whole Time Director and Key Managerial Personnel of the Company with effect from March 31, 2026. However, he continues to serve as the Chief Operating Officer of the Company and is classified as a Senior Management Personnel.

Subsequent to the close of the financial year, Mr. Shubham Kandhway, Company Secretary and Compliance Officer of the Company, tendered his resignation vide letter dated April 1, 2026. He was relieved from his duties with effect from April 15, 2026.

Based on the recommendation of the Nomination and Remuneration Committee, the Board approved the appointment of Ms. Priya Grover as the Company Secretary and Compliance Officer of the Company with effect from July 09, 2026.

Separate Meeting of Independent Directors

In accordance with Schedule IV to the Companies Act, 2013 (Code for Independent Directors) and Regulation 25(3) of the SEBI (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015 ("SEBI LODR"), a separate meeting of the Independent Directors was held on February 6, 2026 without the presence of Executive Directors and members of the management.

During the meeting, the Independent Directors reviewed and assessed the overall performance of the non-independent Directors, and the Board of Directors as a whole, its Committees, and the Chairperson, as well as the quality, quantity, and timeliness of information flow between the management and the Board. They expressed their satisfaction with the information framework and reporting standards adopted by the management and governance standards maintained by the Board, the constructive engagement in discussions, and the strategic oversight demonstrated across all functions. The meeting also reflected positively on the consistent improvement observed in Board effectiveness, as highlighted in the annual Board Evaluation exercise.

Following the meeting, the Chairman of the Nomination and Remuneration Committee (NRC) shared the collective feedback of the Independent Directors with the Board. This included observations on the performance of the Non-Independent Directors, the leadership of the Chairman, and the functioning of the Board as a whole. The feedback was communicated with a view to reinforcing strengths and implementing suitable measures for continuous improvement in governance practices.

The Code applies to all Directors, Promoters, identified Designated Persons, their Immediate Relatives, and other Connected Persons who are reasonably expected to have access to UPSI relating to the Company.

The Company Secretary & Compliance Officer has been designated as the Compliance Officer for the purpose of overseeing adherence to the Code and ensuring compliance with the PIT Regulations.

3. AUDIT COMMITTEE

The Audit Committee of the Board was constituted in 2008. The constitution of Audit Committee complies with the requirements of Section 177 of the Act as well as Regulation 18 of the SEBI LODR.

Powers of Audit Committee

The Audit Committee shall have powers, which include the following:

- to investigate any activity within its terms of reference.
- to seek information from any employee.
- to obtain outside legal or other professional advice.
- to secure attendance of outsiders with relevant expertise, if it considers necessary; and
- such other powers as may be prescribed under the Companies Act and SEBI Listing Regulations.

Terms of reference of the Audit Committee

The terms of reference of the Audit Committee is in line with the regulatory requirements mandated by the Act and Part C of Schedule II of the SEBI LODR which inter alia includes:

- oversight of financial reporting process and the disclosure of financial information relating to the Company to ensure that the financial statements are correct, sufficient, and credible.
- recommendation for appointment, re-appointment, replacement, remuneration and terms of appointment of auditors of the Company and the fixation of the audit fee.

- approval of payment to statutory auditors for any other services rendered by the statutory auditors.
- formulation of a policy on related party transactions, which shall include materiality of related party transactions.
- Following information shall be provided by the Company to Audit Committee for approval by the Audit Committee for a proposed related party transaction:
 - Type, material terms and particulars of the proposed transaction.
 - Name of the related party and its relationship with the listed entity or its subsidiary, including nature of its concern or interest (financial or otherwise).
 - Tenure of the proposed transaction (particular tenure shall be specified).
 - Value of the proposed transaction.
 - The percentage of the listed entity's annual consolidated turnover, for the immediately preceding financial year, that is represented by the value of the proposed transaction (and for a RPT involving a subsidiary, such percentage calculated on the basis of the subsidiary's annual turnover on a standalone basis shall be additionally provided).

If the transaction relates to any loans, inter-corporate deposits, advances, or investments made or given by the listed entity or its subsidiary:

- details of the source of funds in connection with the proposed transaction.
- where any financial indebtedness is incurred to make or give loans, intercorporate deposits, advances, or investments, - nature of indebtedness, cost of funds and tenure.
- applicable terms, including covenants, tenure, interest rate and repayment schedule, whether secured or unsecured; if secured, the nature of security; and
- the purpose for which the funds will be utilized by the ultimate beneficiary of such funds pursuant to the RPT.
- The audit committee shall also review the status of long-term (more than one year) or recurring RPTs on an annual basis.
- reviewing, at least on a quarterly basis, the details of related party transactions entered into by the Company pursuant to each of the omnibus approvals given.
- examining and reviewing, with the management, the annual financial statements and auditor's report thereon before submission to the Board for approval
- reviewing, with the management, the quarterly, half-yearly and annual financial statements before submission to the Board for approval.
- reviewing, with the management, the statement of uses / application of funds raised through an issue (public issue, rights issue, preferential issue, etc.), the statement of funds

utilized for purposes other than those stated in the Offer document / prospectus / notice and the report submitted by the monitoring agency monitoring the utilisation of proceeds of a public or rights issue and making appropriate recommendations to the Board to take up steps in this matter.

- reviewing and monitoring the auditor's independence and performance, and effectiveness of audit process.
- approval of any subsequent modification of transactions of the Company with related parties and omnibus approval for related party transactions proposed to be entered into by the Company, subject to the conditions as may be prescribed

Explanation: The term "related party transactions" shall have the same meaning as provided in Clause 2(z c) of the SEBI Listing Regulations and/or the applicable Accounting Standards and/or the Companies Act, 2013.

- scrutiny of inter-corporate loans and investments.
- valuation of undertakings or assets of the Company, wherever it is necessary.
- evaluation of internal financial controls and risk management systems.
- reviewing, with the management, performance of statutory and internal auditors, adequacy of the internal control systems.
- reviewing the adequacy of internal audit function, if any, including the structure of the internal audit department, staffing and seniority of the official heading the department, reporting structure coverage and frequency of internal audit.
- discussion with internal auditors of any significant findings and follow up there on.
- reviewing the findings of any internal investigations by the internal auditors into matters where there is suspected fraud or irregularity or a failure of internal control systems of a material nature and reporting the matter to the Board.
- discussion with statutory auditors before the audit commences, about the nature and scope of audit as well as post-audit discussion to ascertain any area of concern.
- recommending to the Board of Directors the appointment and removal of the external auditor, fixation of audit fees and approval for payment for any other services.
- looking into the reasons for substantial defaults in the payment to depositors, debenture holders, shareholders (in case of non-payment of declared dividends) and creditors.
- reviewing the functioning of the whistle blower mechanism.
- monitoring the end use of funds raised through public offers and related matters.
- overseeing the vigil mechanism established by the Company, with the chairman of the Audit Committee directly hearing grievances of victimization of employees and Directors, who used vigil mechanism to report genuine concerns in appropriate and exceptional cases.

- approval of appointment of Chief Financial Officer (i.e., the whole-time finance Director or any other person heading the finance function or discharging that function) after assessing the qualifications, experience, and background, etc. of the candidate
- reviewing the utilization of loans and/or advances from / investment by the holding Company in the subsidiary exceeding ₹ 1,000,000,000 or 10% of the asset size of the subsidiary, whichever is lower including existing loans / advances / investments existing.
- carrying out any other functions required to be carried out by the Audit Committee as contained in the SEBI Listing Regulations or any other applicable law, as and when amended from time to time.

- consider and comment on rationale, cost-benefits and impact of schemes involving merger, demerger, amalgamation etc. on the Company and its shareholders; and
- Such roles as may be prescribed under the Companies Act, SEBI Listing Regulations, and other applicable provisions.

Mr. Anil Khanna, Chairman of the Audit Committee, was present at the Annual General Meeting of the Company held on September 15, 2025.

As of March 31, 2026, the Audit Committee comprised three members. All three are Independent Directors. All members are financially literate and possess significant experience in finance, audit, and related fields. Notably, Mr. Anil Khanna brings expertise in accounting and financial management to the Committee.

During the Financial Year 2025–26, the Audit Committee met five times on 5 May 2025; 14 August 2025; 8 November 2025; 6 February 2026; 31 March 2026. The meetings were duly convened with the requisite

quorum, and the interval between any two consecutive meetings did not exceed one hundred and twenty (120) days, in compliance with Regulation 18(2) of the SEBI (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015 ("SEBI LODR")

- the level and composition of remuneration be reasonable and sufficient to attract, retain and motivate Directors of the quality required to run our Company successfully; and
- relationship of remuneration to performance is clear and meets appropriate performance benchmarks
- Formulation of criteria for evaluation of Independent Directors and the Board.

- Devising a policy on Board diversity.
- Identifying persons who are qualified to become Directors and who may be appointed in senior management in accordance with the criteria laid down, and recommend their appointment to the Board and removal and carrying out evaluation of every Director's performance (including Independent Director);
- Determining remuneration, in whatever form, payable to the senior management personnel and other staff (as deemed necessary), which shall be market related, usually consisting of a fixed and variable component.
- Analysing, monitoring, and reviewing various human resource and compensation matters.
- Deciding whether to extend or continue the term of appointment of the Independent Director, on the basis of the report of performance evaluation of Independent Directors.
- Determining the Company's policy on specific remuneration packages for Executive Directors including pension rights and any compensation payment and determining remuneration packages of such Directors.
- Recommending to the Board, all remuneration, in whatever form, payable to Non Executive Directors, the senior management and other staff, as deemed necessary.
- Reviewing and approving the Company's compensation strategy from time to time in the context of the then current Indian market in accordance with applicable laws.
- Perform such functions as are required to be performed by the compensation committee under the Securities and Exchange Board of India (Share Based Employee Benefits) Regulations, 2014, if applicable.

- Frame suitable policies, procedures, and systems to ensure that there is no violation of securities laws, as amended from time to time, including:
 - the Securities and Exchange Board of India (Prohibition of Insider Trading) Regulations, 2015; and
 - the Securities and Exchange Board of India (Prohibition of Fraudulent and Unfair Trade Practices Relating to the Securities Market) Regulations, 2003, by the trust, the Company, and its employees, as applicable.
- For every appointment of an Independent Director, the Nomination and Remuneration Committee shall evaluate the balance of skills, knowledge, and experience on the Board and on the basis of such evaluation, prepare a description of the role and capabilities required of an Independent Director. The person recommended to the Board for appointment as an Independent Director shall have the capabilities identified in such description. For the purpose of identifying suitable candidates, the Committee may:
 - use the services of an external agencies, if required.
 - consider candidates from a wide range of backgrounds, having due regard to diversity; and
 - consider the time commitments of the candidates.
- Administering the employee stock option scheme/ plan approved by the Board and the shareholders of the Company in accordance with the terms of such scheme/ plan ("ESOP Scheme"), if any.
- Construing and interpreting the ESOP Scheme and any agreements defining the rights and obligations of the Company and eligible employees under the ESOP Scheme, and prescribing, amending and/ or rescinding rules and regulations relating to the administration of the ESOP Scheme.
- Perform such other activities as may be delegated by the Board or specified/ provided under the Companies Act, 2013 to the extent notified and effective, as amended or by the Securities and Exchange Board of India (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015, as amended or by any other applicable law or regulatory authority.

Performance Evaluation Criteria for Independent Directors:

1. Brief outline on CSR policy of the Company

Economic Overview

Global Economic Review

Overview

The global economy continued to demonstrate notable resilience in CY 2025, sustaining growth of an estimated 3.4% despite shifting trade policies, renewed geopolitical conflict, and persistent uncertainty. Activity was supported by a surge in technology-related investment, including artificial intelligence (AI), particularly across North America and Asia, alongside broadly accommodative financial conditions and the adaptability of the private sector. The United States economy remained firm, aided by technology investment and supportive fiscal and monetary policy. In contrast, growth in the euro area stayed subdued amid structural headwinds and the lingering effects of elevated energy costs, while China's growth moderated as weakness in its housing sector weighed on domestic demand, partly offset by resilient exports.¹

Outlook

Looking ahead, the global economic outlook remains steady but tilted to the downside. Global growth is projected to ease modestly to 3.1% in CY 2026 and 3.2% in CY 2027², as the drag from tariffs and uncertainty gradually fades while momentum in high-technology sectors moderates. Emerging markets and developing economies are expected to continue outperforming their advanced-economy counterparts. Global headline inflation, estimated at 4.1% in CY 2025, is projected at 4.4% in CY 2026 before easing to 3.7% in CY 2027, reflecting the impact of higher energy prices arising from geopolitical conflict ahead of a resumption of the broader disinflationary trend.

Although geopolitical risks — particularly conflict in the Middle East — and elevated policy uncertainty persist, easing trade tensions, accommodative financial conditions, fiscal support, and ongoing structural reforms are expected to underpin macroeconomic stability. With gradual disinflation, resilient private-sector activity, and sustained investment in technology, the foundation is being laid for a steady, if uneven, global recovery.

Indian Economic Review

During the year under review (FY 2025-26), India retained its position as the world's fastest-growing major economy, with real GDP expanding by 7.7%, as against 7.1% in FY 2024-25³ (as per the revised National Accounts series with base year 2022-23). This robust performance reaffirmed the economy's resilience amidst global headwinds, including geopolitical conflict and trade-policy uncertainty, and was underpinned by buoyant private consumption, strong investment activity, and a marked acceleration in the services sector. Growth momentum remained healthy through the year, with quarterly real GDP growth ranging between 7.8% and 8.2%⁴, led by double-digit expansion in trade, hotels, transport and communication services and resilient manufacturing.

Inflationary pressure eased sharply during the year. Consumer Price Index (CPI) inflation moderated to a multi-year low of around 2.5%

in FY 2025-26, from 4.9% in FY 2024-25, supported by subdued food prices, remaining well within the Reserve Bank of India's (RBI) target band. This softer inflation, together with improving employment and consumer sentiment, reinforced private consumption and supported demand across discretionary and retail segments. India also continued to attract robust foreign direct investment and recorded a narrowing current account deficit, further underscoring the strength of its external position

Outlook

Looking ahead, the outlook for the Indian economy remains constructive, with real GDP growth projected at around 6.5% for FY 2026-27, supported by resilient domestic demand, continued public capital expenditure, and ongoing structural reforms. The Union Budget 2026-27 is expected to play a pivotal role in sustaining this momentum, prioritising productivity, competitiveness, and resilience to global volatility, while maintaining the path of fiscal consolidation — with the fiscal deficit budgeted to narrow to 4.3% of GDP and the debt-to-GDP ratio targeted at 50±1% by 2030-31.

A significant feature of the policy landscape is the continued effective exemption of income tax for individuals earning up to ₹12.75 lakh, together with the implementation of the simplified Income Tax Act, 2025 from 1 April 2026, which are anticipated to release substantial disposable income into the hands of middle-class households. This, coupled with the cumulative 100 bps reduction in the repo rate by the Reserve Bank of India (RBI) to 5.25% during the year⁵, will enhance liquidity in the system. Additionally, the implementation of the 8th Pay Commission is expected to provide further impetus to discretionary spending, thereby supporting demand for premium and luxury goods.

Favourable developments in global trade, including recently concluded free trade agreements, and India's increasing integration into global supply chains are poised to strengthen net external demand.

Industry Overview

Global Premium and Luxury Watch

Overview

The global premium and luxury watch market navigated a challenging year in CY 2025, marked by softer demand in key markets even as the upper end of the segment remained resilient. The global luxury watch market is estimated at approximately USD 45 billion in 2025. Swiss watch exports — the global benchmark for high-end watchmaking — declined by 1.7% to CHF 25.6 billion in 2025, a second consecutive year of contraction following the all-time records of 2021, 2022 and 2023. The subdued performance was driven primarily by a significant contraction in China (–12%) and Hong Kong (–6.5%), and a decline in Japan (–5.8%)⁶, compounded by the disruption from evolving US tariffs, while the price of gold and the Swiss franc reached record highs, significantly increasing the cost of Swiss watches on foreign markets. Notably, the highest price segments continued to show steady demand even as the majority of products saw a downturn, underscoring the resilience of the luxury and high-luxury categories.

Outlook

Looking ahead, the global premium and luxury watch market is positioned for renewed growth, projected to reach around USD 61 billion by 2032 at a CAGR of approximately 4.5%⁷, supported by rising global wealth and the expanding affluent population. Growth is expected to be driven by technological innovation, evolving consumer perception, and the increasing recognition of luxury timepieces not

only as symbols of prestige and personal style but also as viable, value-retaining investment assets. The United States, which accounted for 17% of Swiss watch exports in 2025, has consolidated its status as the main destination market, while the Middle East and India have emerged as notable bright spots, and the broader recovery is expected to depend on a gradual stabilisation of demand in China.⁸

India's watch industry

With rising disposable incomes and growing fashion consciousness, the Indian watch market continues to expand robustly. The Indian watch market is estimated at USD 4.19 billion in 2025 and is projected to reach USD 7.52 billion by 2031, growing at a CAGR of 10.23%, with the premium segment poised to grow at an 8.53% CAGR and online retail at 9.12%, led by metropolitan and Tier-II consumers.¹⁰ A significant structural tailwind is the India–EFTA trade agreement, the phased removal of the customs duty on Swiss watches — under which the duty has already fallen from a base of 22% to 15.71% across the first two tranches, en route to full elimination by 2031 is set to lower retail prices and broaden the premium customer base. While offline retail retained a commanding 77.72% share in 2025, the rapid formalisation of the market and the entry of new brands are expected to intensify competition.

Preference for luxury products in India

Recent years have witnessed a marked shift in India's demand and preference patterns. With rising aspirations and an increasing demand for quality, luxury products continue to record strong growth in sales, supported by India's robust economic expansion, higher per capita income, and rising consumption.

India is home to one of Asia's fastest-growing luxury markets. The country's strong economic growth has driven a steady increase in the number of high-net-worth and ultra-high-net-worth individuals — UBS estimates that India's affluent population is likely to double by 2028 to 88 million — further fuelling demand for luxury products, particularly watches. This momentum is reflected in Swiss watch exports to India, which rose 8.9% in 2025, following an increase of 25.2% in 2024 — confirming the rapid expansion of luxury in the country, among the strongest growth rates of any major market.

Outlook

The market is expected to maintain its growth momentum, supported by continued premiumisation and rising aspirational consumption. Consumer preference is likely to remain focused on branded, certified and high-value timepieces, while expansion into non-metro markets and deeper retail penetration are expected to drive additional growth opportunities. Together, evolving consumer preferences and strengthening distribution networks should continue to support the segment's overall growth trajectory.

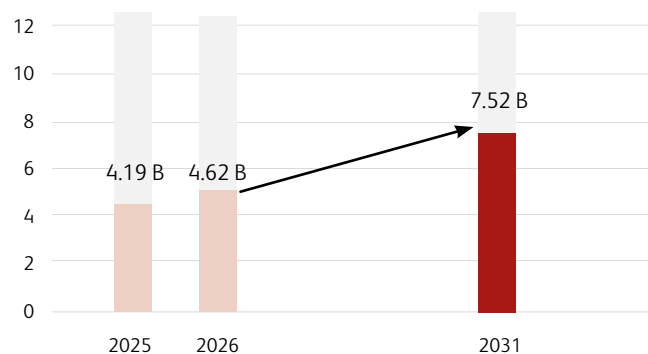

The Pre-Owned Watch Market

Global

The global pre-owned watch market has continued to witness remarkable growth, emerging as one of the fastest-growing segments within the broader horology industry. The global pre-owned luxury watches market was estimated at USD 24.38 billion in 2023 and is projected to reach USD 45.01 billion by 2030, growing at a CAGR of 9.2%, with Asia-Pacific the fastest-growing region¹¹. This expansion is driven primarily by affordability, sustainability, and immediate availability, which collectively make high-end timepieces more accessible without compromising on brand appeal.

The proliferation of trusted online and offline marketplaces — offering authentication, warranties, and transparent pricing — has further legitimised the segment, while the active participation of leading luxury brands through certified pre-owned (CPO) programmes has significantly enhanced consumer trust. Encouragingly, secondary-market prices rose 4.9% over the full year 2025, a meaningful recovery from declines of 6.1% in 2024 and 10.7% in 2023,¹² reflecting renewed collector confidence. With growing awareness, brand acceptance, and digital accessibility, the global pre-owned segment is expected to remain a powerful growth engine within the luxury watch market.

Consequently, pre-owned timepieces are increasingly regarded as prudent and sustainable investments that pair the prestige of luxury with more accessible entry price points. Supported by rising consumer awareness, growing brand participation, and expanding digital access, the global pre-owned watch segment is expected to remain a key engine of growth within the luxury watch market.

Indian

In India, the pre-owned luxury watch segment is on the cusp of rapid expansion, mirroring trends observed in other emerging economies. India's pre-owned luxury watch market is among the fastest-growing segments in the category, expanding at a CAGR of roughly 11% as authentication, warranties, and brand-led certification steadily build consumer trust.¹³ This growth is driven by affordability, sustainability, and the increasing perception of timepieces as investment assets, with majority of Indian watch buyers indicating interest in certified pre-owned, according to Deloitte's spotlight on the Indian watch buyer. The

pre-owned channel also offers access to rare, discontinued, and antique timepieces that are otherwise extremely difficult to source, lending the segment a distinct collector appeal and a further point of differentiation. The maturing ecosystem of authentication, refurbishment, and resale platforms is expected to support healthier, more transparent pricing in the pre-owned channel.

Moreover, the continued growth of India's primary luxury watch market is anticipated to set in motion a self-reinforcing cycle of demand, thereby widening opportunities within the pre-owned category. With Indian consumers becoming progressively more brand-conscious and investment-oriented, the pre-owned watch market is poised to develop into a key engine of growth, presenting considerable potential for both established and emerging participants in the horology sector.

Swiss Watch Market

Overview

Swiss watchmaking continues to set the global benchmark for fine horology — a standing built on precision engineering, deep heritage, and exacting craftsmanship. The year under review, however, ranked among the more testing in recent memory. Demand cooled across several established markets, the United States introduced steep new import duties, and record highs in both the Swiss franc and gold prices lifted production and retail costs in tandem. Against this backdrop, India stood out as a clear pocket of strength, its widening base of affluent, brand-aware consumers turning the country into a focal point of the industry's growth ambitions.

In India, a fine Swiss watch is increasingly acquired as a marker of personal achievement and as an heirloom to be handed down, rather than as a simple accessory. The India-EFTA Trade and Economic Partnership Agreement, under which duties on Swiss watches are being phased down, is expected to encourage a wider range of global watch brands to establish a presence in India over time and ultimately deepening the breadth and quality of choice available to Indian consumers, a landmark development for the country's luxury watch market, while continuing to reinforce the appeal of officially retailed timepieces.

The aggregate numbers reflected the strain. The United States remained the largest market at 16.8% of exports (CHF 4.4 billion in 2024), even as a 39% US import tariff on Swiss watches took effect on 7 August 2025, while exports to China fell to CHF 2.1 billion in 2024, a decline of 26%. Yet the market remained distinctly two-speed: around 64% of executives viewed the outlook for high-end watches above CHF 50,000 positively, while close to 60% rated the entry-level and mid-range segments negatively. India was the exception to the broader softness — exports to the country rose nearly 7% in the first eight months of 2025 and by more than 30% over two years, making it the fastest-growing major market for Swiss watches.¹⁵

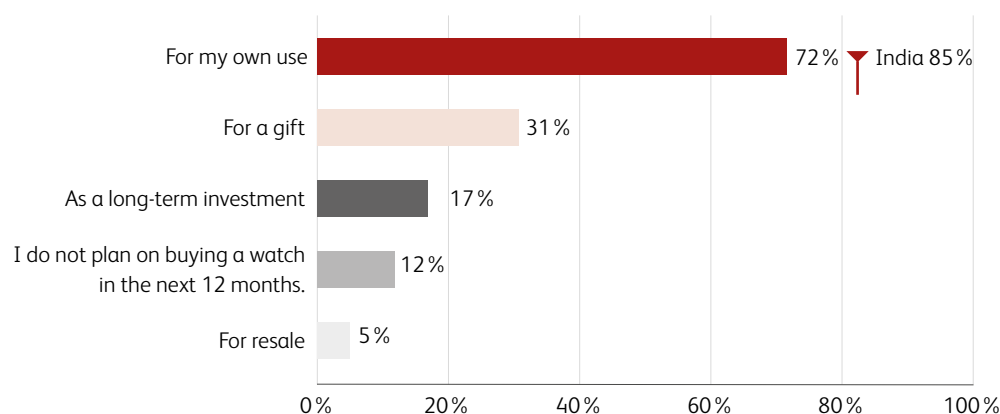

Outlook

The medium-term outlook is one of measured confidence rather than exuberance. India is widely seen as the single most promising market — close to four in five industry executives (79%) anticipate medium-to-strong growth there — but converting that potential into durable share will depend on consistent brand-building, localisation, and the education of a relatively young collector base. Manufacturers are responding by deepening ties with trusted retail partners and investing in experiential, omnichannel formats designed around the Indian buyer.

The pre-owned and certified pre-owned (CPO) market is becoming an increasingly important profit pool, opening fresh revenue channels and extending brand lifecycle value; tellingly, 40% of millennial and Gen Z consumers say they are likely to buy a pre-owned watch in the coming year. Sustainability, too, is moving from the periphery to the core of brand strategy, with leading houses embedding ethical sourcing, eco-innovation, and circular-economy principles into how their watches are made and sold.

Ultimately, sustained leadership will reward the brands that can hold competing priorities in balance — heritage alongside innovation, exclusivity alongside accessibility, and craftsmanship alongside conscious luxury. As a younger, more digitally fluent generation of collectors comes to the fore, those that pair authentic storytelling with a seamless physical-and-digital experience will be best placed to capture the next phase of growth.

Indian Premium and Luxury Watch Industry

The Indian watch market segments:

Premium Segment

Includes bridge to-luxury brands.

Overview

India's premium and luxury watch segment has moved from the margins to the mainstream of the country's consumption story. Powered by sustained economic momentum and a steadily broadening affluent class, it is riding a structural shift in which a rising share of households is crossing into the upper-middle and high-income brackets — a proportion set to expand materially by the end of the decade. The outcome is a deepening pool of discretionary spending, led by high-net-worth individuals and a notably young cohort of aspirational buyers for whom a fine timepiece signals success and identity as much as taste.

India's wider luxury goods market, estimated at around USD 7 billion in 2024, is projected to expand to roughly USD 30 billion by 2030, driven by younger generations. Within that expansion, globally renowned Swiss and international brands are capturing a disproportionate share — a momentum underscored by the more-than-30% rise in Swiss watch exports to India over the two years to 2025.¹⁶ With younger consumers gravitating towards exclusivity, craftsmanship, and brand heritage, the category has reached a genuine inflection point, positioning India among the most attractive long-term frontiers for global watchmakers.

Outlook

The trajectory ahead is firmly positive. Resilient economic growth, rising incomes, and an expanding base of dollar millionaires are expected to keep demand for premium timepieces on an upward path. Just as importantly, the spread of e-commerce and digital discovery has carried luxury brands well beyond the metros into Tier 2 and Tier 3 cities, unlocking aspirational demand that was previously difficult to reach and sharpening brand visibility and engagement across the country. Markets like India are viewed as a source of young, dynamic customers who are open to innovation, offering the Swiss watch industry a long-term avenue to broaden its global footprint.¹⁷

Swiss heritage houses are leaning into this opportunity — expanding their retail presence and building omnichannel strategies tailored to Indian tastes. A parallel trend is the rising appetite for personalised, bespoke, and limited-edition pieces among younger, brand-literate buyers who prize rarity and provenance. With a favourable demographic dividend, fast-evolving preferences, and deepening brand affinity, India is well positioned to rank among the most strategically important markets for global luxury watch brands over the coming decade.

The Company operates in India's premium and luxury watch retail segment, one of the country's most attractive and fastest-growing consumption categories. Backed by a pan-India presence, deep category expertise, and a long track record of navigating market cycles, the Company is well positioned to convert the structural expansion of this market into sustained, profitable growth. The principal growth drivers identified by the Management are set out below.

Segment-wise / product-wise performance

During FY 2025-26, Ethos continued to operate across three principal segments, namely **Luxury Retail (Watches and Lifestyle)**, **Certified Pre-Owned (CPO)**, and **Service Vertical**.

The **Luxury Retail segment** remained the primary driver of the Company's revenue, led by sustained in-store demand for Swiss and international high-luxury watch brands. The Company's exclusive brand partnerships, together with a premium in-boutique experience, continued to reinforce customer loyalty and high-value transactions. During the year, the Company expanded its boutique network from 73 to 94 boutiques across 30 cities and 103 boutiques across 34 cities as on date and reorganised its Lifestyle vertical, comprising the Messika and Rimowa businesses, under a separate entity, Ethos Lifestyle Private Limited, reflecting the growing scale of its diversification into fine jewellery and luxury luggage. The Lifestyle vertical has emerged as a distinct engine of growth within this segment: during the year the Company opened India's first Messika boutique and expanded the Rimowa presence, broadening its addressable market beyond watches and deepening engagement with affluent, brand-conscious consumers. This diversification positions the Company to capture a larger share of overall luxury spending while leveraging its existing retail footprint and clientele.

The **Certified Pre-Owned (CPO)** business, a relatively nascent vertical, continued to record strong growth momentum. This was supported by rising consumer interest in authenticated pre-owned timepieces and underpinned by the Company's trusted sourcing and quality-assurance framework.

The **Service Vertical**, comprising after-sales service, repair, and maintenance, continued to strengthen as an integral extension of the Company's value proposition. Operating through Ethos Watch Care and its network of authorised service centres, the Company services and repairs over 70 of the world's leading luxury watch brands, supported by certified watchmakers and state-of-the-art facilities. During the year, the Company incorporated a new subsidiary, Micron Watch Services Private Limited — in which it holds a 50.10% stake — to establish dedicated watch service centres across select Indian cities.

Risk management

The Board of Directors of Ethos undertakes a timely review of the business risks and, in conjunction therewith, implements appropriate measures to mitigate such risks at the earliest. The Senior Leadership Team, led by the Chairman & Whole Time Director and the Managing Director & CEO, is responsible for executing the mitigation measures necessary to manage the identified risks. The Company has further constituted a Risk Management Committee, which oversees and reviews the business risks of the Company from time to time.

Financial Performance With Respect to Operational Performance:

During FY 2025-26, Ethos Limited delivered strong top-line growth, even as profitability was tempered by external cost pressures. On a standalone basis, turnover (including other income) rose to ₹1,65,311.97 lakhs, an increase of approximately 29.5% over ₹1,27,651.39 lakhs in the previous year, while consolidated turnover grew by a comparable margin to ₹1,65,840.54 lakhs. This growth was led by a deliberate shift

towards the luxury and high-luxury segments, volume growth, and the continued scaling of the certified pre-owned (CPO) business.

Profitability reflected a more demanding operating environment. Standalone profit before tax and profit after tax moderated to ₹12,746.95 lakhs and ₹9,492.23 lakhs respectively (from ₹13,155.29 lakhs and ₹9,825.41 lakhs), while on a consolidated basis profit before tax rose to ₹13,085.16 lakhs and profit after tax (after minority interest) stood at ₹9,476.52 lakhs. Margins were affected principally by the

sharp appreciation of the Swiss Franc against the Rupee, up over ~23% during the year and crossing ₹120 in January 2026, which increased the cost of imported inventory, together with higher marketing investment and the upfront costs of an accelerated pace of boutique expansion. Consequently, the operating profit margin moderated to 9.55% and the net profit margin to 5.89%. Earnings per share of ₹36.27 (standalone) and ₹36.21 (consolidated) additionally reflect the enlarged equity base following the rights issue undertaken during the year.

Operationally, the Company expanded its boutique network from 73 to 94 boutiques across 30 cities (102 boutiques across 103 boutiques across 34 cities as on date), deepened its omnichannel capabilities, strengthened its after-sales service vertical, and added new brand partnerships across its luxury and high-luxury portfolio — including the reorganisation of its lifestyle vertical, comprising the Messika and

Overall, the Company's performance reflects healthy operational execution and disciplined balance-sheet management, even as currency and expansion-related costs weighed on near-term margins. The management remains focused on long-term value creation through profitable and sustainable growth.

Rimowa businesses, under a dedicated entity, Ethos Lifestyle Private Limited. These initiatives supported higher footfalls, a richer product mix, and stronger customer engagement.

The Company's Balance Sheet strengthened materially during the year. The current ratio improved to 5.48 times (from 4.97), reflecting a more robust liquidity position, while the debt-equity ratio eased to 0.21 times (from 0.28), aided by the equity raised through the rights issue. The Debtors Turnover Ratio improved to 90.54 times (from 73.99), reflecting efficient receivables management, and the Inventory Turnover Days improved to 222 days (from 246) reflection of better inventory management. The Interest Coverage Ratio moderated to 5.80 times (from 7.78), primarily on account of lower operating profit and higher finance costs associated with lease liabilities recognised on new boutiques under Ind AS 116.

Explanation for variance in ratios

- Debt Equity Ratio — The debt-equity ratio decreased from 0.28 to 0.21 due to infusion of funds through rights issue proceeds during the year ended March 31, 2026, resulting in strengthening of the Company's equity base.
- Return on Equity Ratio — The return on equity ratio decreased from 10.55% to 7.71% primarily due to increase in shareholders' equity consequent to infusion of funds through the rights issue. Further, net profit declined compared to the previous year on account of adverse foreign exchange fluctuations in global markets, which impacted the cost of imported materials. As a result, despite the increase in equity base, profitability declined during the year.
- Net Profit Ratio — The net profit ratio decreased from 7.85% to 5.89% mainly due to upfront investment in expansion, operating and other costs, despite growth in revenue and improved business performance during the current year.
- Return on Capital Employed — ROCE decreased from 12.00% to 8.60% primarily on account of increase in capital employed following fund infusion during the year, while the corresponding return generation remained moderate.

e. Return on Investment — ROI decreased from 3.44% to 1.68% mainly due to lower returns earned on investments and increase in the investment base during the current year.

Human Resource

The Company recognises that a competent and motivated workforce constitutes a fundamental driver of its sustained performance. Ethos remains committed to attracting and retaining qualified professionals whose objectives are consistent with the Company's values, vision, and customer-centric orientation. The Company's human resource policies have been framed to ensure that each member of the workforce contributes meaningfully towards the attainment of the Company's growth objectives.

The Company undertakes regular investment in training and development initiatives and promotes a culture of continuous learning across the organisation. Such initiatives enable employees to remain apprised of prevailing industry developments, augment their functional competence, and enhance the quality of service rendered.

Employee recognition and performance management form an integral component of the Company's human resource practices. Periodic evaluations, structured feedback mechanisms, and merit-based recognition collectively foster a transparent and performance-oriented working environment.

As on March 31, 2026, the Company employed 1069 full-time personnel, of whom 225 are women, representing approximately 21.0% of the total workforce, in furtherance of the Company's commitment to diversity and inclusion.

The Company further accords due emphasis to employee well-being. Medical and accidental insurance coverage, together with periodic health and wellness check-ups, form part of the Company's employee care framework, thereby supporting both professional development and workforce continuity.

The Company has a strong and experienced leadership team in place, supported by well-defined succession planning processes to ensure management continuity and organizational stability.

Internal Control Systems and Their Adequacy

Ethos Limited has instituted robust internal control systems together with a structured internal audit framework, with a view to safeguarding the Company's assets, ensuring the accuracy and reliability of financial reporting, and facilitating effective operational management. The internal audit function operates independently and reports directly

to the Audit Committee and the Board of Directors, thereby ensuring oversight and transparency at the highest levels of governance.

As part of the said control framework, the Company conducts monthly and quarterly business reviews to assess unit-level performance and effect timely corrective measures. A well-defined capital expenditure control mechanism has been established to monitor and approve investments in assets and new projects, thereby ensuring prudent financial management and adherence to the approved budgets and timelines.

The findings of the internal audit, together with the corresponding corrective actions, are reported to the Audit Committee and the Senior Management Team on a periodic basis. The Audit Committee further reviews the quarterly, half-yearly, and annual financial statements, thereby providing governance-level assurance as to financial integrity and the effectiveness of the internal controls.

During the year under review, the Company undertook a comprehensive evaluation of its internal financial controls, the results whereof indicated satisfactory compliance. The recommendations arising therefrom were implemented in a timely manner. The Company continues to refine its Policy Guidelines and Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs) to ensure alignment with evolving corporate governance standards and applicable regulatory requirements.

Disclosure of Accounting Treatment

The financial statements of Ethos Limited for the year ended March 31, 2026 have been prepared in accordance with the applicable Indian Accounting Standards (Ind AS) as prescribed under Section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013, read with the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 (as amended from time to time), and other applicable provisions of the Companies Act, 2013.

No change has been made in the accounting treatment followed by the Company during the year under review as compared with the immediately preceding financial year. The accounting policies have been applied consistently to preserve the comparability and reliability of the financial information presented.

No treatment differing from that prescribed under any applicable accounting standard has been adopted in the preparation of the financial statements which would necessitate specific disclosure under Regulation 34(3) read with Schedule V of the SEBI (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015.

Observations:

During the period, under review the Company has complied with the provisions of the Act, Rules, Regulations w.r.t the above mentioned acts and rules and I have the following observations:

1. There was a delay in intimation of the Board Meeting to National Stock Exchange of India Limited and BSE Limited within the timeline prescribed under Regulation 29 of the SEBI LODR Regulations. Consequently, a penalty of Rs. 10,000/- each was levied by National Stock Exchange of India Limited ("NSE") and BSE Limited ("BSE") respectively for such delay, which has been paid by the Company, and no further action has been initiated by the Stock Exchanges in this regard.
2. The Audit Committee of the Company was not properly constituted for the quarter ended September 30, 2022, in terms of Regulation 18 of the SEBI (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015. The National Stock Exchange of India Limited ("NSE"), vide its letter dated June 5, 2025, levied a penalty of Rs. 1,34,000/- on the Company for such non-compliance, which was paid by the Company on June 5, 2025, and no further action has been initiated by the Stock Exchange in this regard.
3. The Audit Committee of the Company was not properly constituted for the quarter ended December 31, 2022, in terms of Regulation 18 of the SEBI (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015. The National Stock Exchange of India Limited ("NSE"), vide its letter dated June 5, 2025, levied a penalty of Rs. 14,000/- on the Company for such non-compliance, which was paid by the Company on June 5, 2025, and no further action has been initiated by the Stock Exchange in this regard.

4. Save and except as stated hereinabove, there is no other instance of non-compliance noted during the period under review. However, it is pertinent to note that Mr. Narendra Kumar Mohatta, who had received an allotment of Rights Shares on July 8, 2025, gifted 833 equity shares of the Company to his son, Mr. Alok Mohatta, on November 12, 2025, which transaction resulted in a technical breach of the contra-trade restrictions prescribed under the Company's Code of Conduct for Prevention of Insider Trading framed under the SEBI (Prohibition of Insider Trading) Regulations, 2015.

Since the said transaction was in the nature of a gift and no monetary gain or profit was derived by the transferor, the Compliance Officer of the Company, in exercise of the powers conferred under Clause 5.23.2 of the "Code of Conduct for Prevention of Insider Trading and Code of Practices and Procedures for Fair Disclosure of Unpublished Price Sensitive Information" of the Company, granted relaxation from the contra-trade restrictions in respect of the said transaction.

I further report that:

The Board of Directors of the Company is duly constituted. There have been changes in the composition of the Board of Directors that took place during the period under review and these changes were carried out in compliance with the provisions of the Act.

Adequate notice is given to all the directors to schedule the Board Meeting, agenda were sent at least seven days in advance and system exist for seeking and obtaining further information and clarification on the agenda items before the meeting and for meaning full participation at the meeting; and

Majority decision is carried through while the dissenting members' views are captured and recorded as part of the minutes.

I further report that there are adequate systems and processes in the Company commensurate with the size and operations of the Company to monitor and ensure compliance with applicable laws, rules, regulations and guidelines.

I further report that that during the audit period following event occurred which had bearing on the Company's affairs in pursuance of the above referred laws, rules, regulations, guidelines, standards etc.

1. Right Issue

During the financial year 2025-26, the Board of Directors, at its meeting held on June 3, 2025, approved the raising of funds through a Rights Issue. Pursuant thereto, the Company successfully completed a Rights Issue comprising 22,77,250 equity shares of face value Rs 10 each at an issue price of Rs. 1,800 per equity share (including a securities premium of Rs. 1,790 per equity share), aggregating to Rs. 409,90,50,000 (Rupees Four Hundred and Nine Crores Ninety Lakhs Fifty Thousand only).

The Rights Issue was undertaken to (i) fund the working capital requirements of the Company; and (ii) meet general corporate purposes. The Rights Equity Shares were offered to the eligible equity shareholders in the ratio of 4 (Four) Rights Equity Shares for every 43 (Forty Three) fully paid-up equity shares held by them as on the Record Date, i.e., June 12, 2025.

The Rights Issue opened on June 20, 2025 and closed on July 3, 2025. Pursuant to the basis of allotment approved by the designated stock exchange, the Rights Equity Shares were allotted on July 4, 2025 and

were listed and admitted to trading on BSE Limited and the National Stock Exchange of India Limited with effect from July 8, 2025. The Rights Equity Shares rank pari passu in all respects with the existing equity shares of the Company, including with respect to dividend and other corporate benefits.

KFin Technologies Limited acted as the Registrar to the Issue and CRISIL Limited was appointed as the Monitoring Agency in accordance with the applicable provisions of the SEBI (Issue of Capital and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2018.

2. Incorporation of Subsidiary Companies

- (i) **Ficus Trading LLC ('Ficus')** - Ficus is a wholly owned subsidiary body corporate of the Company and is engaged in the business of trading of Watches, Clocks & Spare Parts. It was incorporated in April 2025, to expand the Company's presence in international markets, particularly in the GCC region. The business is aligned with the main line of business of the Company. During the year under review, it has reported revenue from operations amounting to Rs 2.57 Cr and its net profit stood at Rs 0.25 Cr.
- (ii) **Micron Watch Service Private Limited ('Micron')** - Micron is a Joint Venture Subsidiary of the Company and is engaged in the business of Watch services and repair. It was incorporated in August 2025. During the year under review, it has not reported any revenue from operations and its net loss stood at Rs. 64,771

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Key Audit Matters

4. Key audit matters are those matters that, in our professional judgment, were of most significance in our audit of the standalone financial statements of the current period. These matters were addressed in the context of our audit of the standalone financial statements as a whole, and in forming our opinion thereon, and we do not provide a separate opinion on these matters.
5. We have determined the matter described below to be the key audit matter to be communicated in our report.

Key audit matters

1. Existence and Valuation of Inventory

Refer note no 2.2(e) of the accompanying standalone financial statements for material accounting policy information on inventories and note no 11 for details of inventories as at 31 March 2026.

The total value of inventories as at 31 March 2026 amount to INR 68,062.26 lakhs, representing 34% of the total assets of the Company. The inventories primarily comprise of watches, which are stored across various retail outlets and third-party locations situated nationwide and valued at cost and net realisable value ('NRV'), whichever is lower, in accordance with the principles of Ind AS 2, "Inventories" ('Ind AS 2').

The Company conducts periodic physical verification as part of its physical verification plan. However, given the multiple locations, high value of such watches, there is an inherent risk of loss, including theft, which requires significant attention and audit efforts to obtain comfort on existence of such inventories.

While assessing the provision for slow-moving or obsolete inventory management applies significant judgements and estimates, such as age of the products, past sales trend, future sales volumes of such brands, potential brand discontinuance, changing consumer demands and fashion trends.

How our audit addressed the key audit matters

Our audit procedure in relation to the existence and valuation of inventories included, but was not limited to, the following:

- Obtained an understanding of the management's process of physical verification and safeguarding of inventories, identifying slow-moving or obsolete inventory and NRV assessment and evaluated the appropriateness of related accounting policy for provision and valuation of inventories as per Ind AS 2;
- Evaluated the design and tested the operating effectiveness of management's key internal controls, including general and specific information technology controls over physical verification and valuation of inventories;
- On a sample basis, inspected management's inventory counts records and further observed physical verification conducted by the management and performed independent test counts including testing the roll-forward/roll-backward workings where required for locations selected based on materiality and risk considerations;
- Obtained ageing of inventories and tested the ageing, on sample basis;

Information other than the Standalone Financial Statements and Auditor's Report thereon

6. The Company's Board of Directors are responsible for the other information. The other information comprises the information included in the Annual Report, but does not include the standalone financial statements and our auditor's report thereon. The Annual Report, is expected to be made available to us after the date of this auditor's report.

Our opinion on the standalone financial statements does not cover the other information and we will not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with our audit of the standalone financial statements, our responsibility is to read the other information identified above when it becomes available and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the standalone financial statements or our knowledge obtained in the audit or otherwise appears to be materially misstated.

When we read the Annual Report, if we conclude that there is a material misstatement therein, we are required to communicate the matter to those charged with governance.

Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Standalone Financial Statements

7. The accompanying standalone financial statements have been approved by the Company's Board of Directors. The Company's Board of Directors are responsible for the matters stated in section 134(5) of the Act with respect to the preparation and presentation of these standalone financial statements that give a true and fair view of the financial position, financial performance including other comprehensive income, changes in equity and cash flows of the Company in accordance with the Ind AS specified under section 133 of the Act and other accounting principles generally accepted in India. This responsibility also includes maintenance of adequate accounting records in accordance with the provisions of the Act for safeguarding of the assets of the Company and for preventing and detecting frauds and other irregularities; selection and application of appropriate accounting policies; making judgments and estimates that are reasonable and prudent; and design, implementation and maintenance of adequate internal

financial controls, that were operating effectively for ensuring the accuracy and completeness of the accounting records, relevant to the preparation and presentation of the financial statements that give a true and fair view and are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

8. In preparing the standalone financial statements, the Board of Directors is responsible for assessing the Company's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the Board of Directors either intends to liquidate the Company or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.
9. The Board of Directors is also responsible for overseeing the Company's financial reporting process.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Standalone Financial Statements

10. Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the standalone financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Standards on Auditing will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these standalone financial statements.
11. As part of an audit in accordance with Standards on Auditing, specified under section 143(10) of the Act we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. We also:
- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the standalone financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve

collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control;

- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances. Under section 143(3)(i) of the Act we are also responsible for expressing our opinion on whether the Company has adequate internal financial controls with reference to financial statements in place and the operating effectiveness of such controls;
 - Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by management;
 - Conclude on the appropriateness of Board of Directors' use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the Company's ability to continue as a going concern. If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditor's report to the related disclosures in the standalone financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Company to cease to continue as a going concern; and
 - Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the standalone financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the standalone financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.
12. We communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.
 13. We also provide those charged with governance with a statement that we have complied with relevant ethical requirements regarding independence, and to communicate with them all relationships and other matters that may reasonably be thought to bear on our independence, and where applicable, related safeguards.
 14. From the matters communicated with those charged with governance, we determine those matters that were of most significance in the audit of the standalone financial statements of the current period and are therefore the key audit matters. We describe these matters in our auditor's report unless law or regulation precludes public disclosure about the matter or when, in extremely rare circumstances, we determine that a matter should not be communicated in our report because the adverse consequences of doing so would reasonably be expected to outweigh the public interest benefits of such communication.
15. As required by section 197(16) of the Act, based on our audit, we report that the Company has paid remuneration to its directors during the year in accordance with the provisions of and limits laid down under section 197 read with Schedule V to the Act.
16. As required by the Companies (Auditor's Report) Order, 2020 ('the Order') issued by the Central Government of India in terms of section 143(11) of the Act we give in the Annexure I a statement on the matters specified in paragraphs 3 and 4 of the Order, to the extent applicable.
 17. Further to our comments in **Annexure I**, as required by section 143(3) of the Act based on our audit, we report, to the extent applicable, that:
 - a) We have sought and obtained all the information and explanations which to the best of our knowledge and belief were necessary for the purpose of our audit of the accompanying standalone financial statements;
 - b) In our opinion, proper books of account as required by law have been kept by the Company so far as it appears from our examination of those books;
 - c) The standalone financial statements dealt with by this report are in agreement with the books of account;
 - d) In our opinion, the aforesaid standalone financial statements comply with Ind AS specified under section 133 of the Act;
 - e) On the basis of the written representations received from the directors and taken on record by the Board of Directors, none of the directors is disqualified as on 31 March 2026 from being appointed as a director in terms of section 164(2) of the Act;
 - f) With respect to the adequacy of the internal financial controls with reference to financial statements of the Company as on 31 March 2026 and the operating effectiveness of such controls, refer to our separate report in Annexure II wherein we have expressed an unmodified opinion;
 - g) With respect to the other matters to be included in the Auditor's Report in accordance with rule 11 of the Companies (Audit and Auditors) Rules, 2014 (as amended), in our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us:
 - i. The Company, as detailed in note 35 to the standalone financial statements, has disclosed the impact of pending litigations on its financial position as at 31 March 2026;
 - ii. The Company did not have any long-term contracts including derivative contracts for which there were any material foreseeable losses as at 31 March 2026;
 - iii. There were no amounts which were required to be transferred to the Investor Education and Protection Fund by the Company during the year ended 31 March 2026;
 - iv. a. The management has represented that, to the best of its knowledge and belief, as disclosed in note 45(5) to the standalone financial

The management has represented that, to the best of its knowledge and belief, as disclosed in note 45(6) to the standalone financial statements, no funds have been received by the Company from any persons or entities, including foreign entities ('the Funding Parties'), with the understanding, whether recorded in writing or otherwise, that the Company shall, whether directly or indirectly, lend or invest in other persons or entities identified in any manner whatsoever by or on behalf of the Funding Party ('Ultimate Beneficiaries') or provide any guarantee, security or the like on behalf of the Ultimate Beneficiaries; and
- c. Based on such audit procedures performed as considered reasonable and appropriate in the circumstances, nothing has come to our notice that has caused us to believe that the management representations under sub-clauses (a) and (b) above contain any material misstatement.
- v. The Company has not declared or paid any dividend during the year ended 31 March 2026; and
- vi. As stated in note 52 to the standalone financial statements and based on our examination which included test checks, the Company, in respect of financial year commencing on 1 April 2025 to 31 March 2026, has used an accounting softwares for maintaining its books of account which has a feature of recording audit trail (edit log) facility and the same have been operated throughout the year for all relevant transactions recorded in the software. Further, during the course of our audit we did not come across any instance of audit trail feature being tampered with. Furthermore, the audit trail has been preserved by the Company as per the statutory requirements for record retention.

3. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on the Company's internal financial controls with reference to financial statements based on our audit. 6. A company's internal financial controls with reference to financial statements include those policies and procedures that (1) pertain to the maintenance of records that, in reasonable detail, accurately and fairly reflect the transactions and dispositions of the assets of the company; (2) provide reasonable assurance that transactions are recorded as necessary to permit preparation of financial statements in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, and that receipts and expenditures of the company are being made only in accordance with authorisations of management and directors of the company; and (3) provide reasonable assurance regarding prevention or timely detection of unauthorised acquisition, use, or disposition of the company's assets that could have a material effect on the financial statements.

Inherent Limitations of Internal Financial Controls with Reference to Financial Statements

7. Because of the inherent limitations of internal financial controls with reference to financial statements, including the possibility of collusion or improper management override of controls, material misstatements due to error or fraud may occur and not be detected. Also, projections of any evaluation of the internal financial controls with reference to financial statements to future periods are subject to the risk that the internal financial controls with reference to financial statements may become inadequate because of changes in conditions, or that the degree of compliance with the policies or procedures may deteriorate.

Opinion

8. In our opinion, the Company has, in all material respects, adequate internal financial controls with reference to financial statements and such controls were operating effectively as at 31 March 2026, based on the internal control over financial reporting criteria established by the Company considering the essential components of internal control stated in the Guidance Note issued by the ICAI.

Notes to the Standalone Financial Statements for the year ended March 31, 2026

1. Corporate Information

Ethos Limited ('Ethos' or 'the Company'), a subsidiary of KDDL Limited, is a public limited company and was incorporated on November 5, 2007 under the provisions of the Companies Act applicable in India. Its shares are listed on two recognised stock exchanges in India. The registered office of the Company is located at Plot No. 3, Sector III, Parwanoo, Himachal Pradesh. The Corporate Identification Number of the Company is L52300HP2007PLC030800.

The Company's business consists of retail trading of premium and luxury watches, accessories and other luxury items and rendering of related after sale services.

The standalone financial statements were approved for issue in accordance with a resolution of the directors on May 12, 2026.

2. Material accounting policies

2.1 Basis of preparation

These standalone financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Indian Accounting Standards (Ind AS) as per the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 (as amended from time to time) and presentation requirements of Division II of Schedule III to the Companies Act, 2013 (Ind AS compliant Schedule III).

The accounting policies have been consistently applied except where a newly issued accounting standard is initially adopted or a revision to an existing accounting standard requires a change in the accounting policy hitherto in use.

The standalone financial statements provide comparative information in respect of the corresponding previous year.

The functional currency of the Company is the Indian rupee. These standalone financial statements are presented in Indian rupees. All amounts have been rounded-off to the nearest lakhs, up to two places of decimal, unless otherwise indicated.

Basis of measurement

The standalone financial statements have been prepared on a historical cost convention on accrual basis, except for certain assets and liabilities that are measured at fair values at the end of each reporting period, as explained in the accounting policies below.

The Company have prepared the standalone financial statements on the basis that they will continue to operate as a going concern.

2.2 Summary of material accounting policies

a) Current versus non-current classification

Based on the time involved between the acquisition of assets for processing and their realization in cash and cash equivalents, the Company has identified twelve months as its operating cycle for determining current and non-current classification of assets and liabilities in the balance sheet.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are classified as non-current assets and liabilities.

b) Investment in subsidiaries, associate and joint venture

A subsidiary is an entity that is controlled by another entity.

An associate is an entity over which the Company has significant influence. Significant influence is the power to participate in the financial and operating policy decisions of the investee but is not control or joint control over those policies.

A joint venture is a type of joint arrangement whereby the parties that have joint control of the arrangement have rights to the net assets of the joint venture. Joint control is the contractually agreed sharing of control of an arrangement, which exists only when decisions about the relevant activities require unanimous consent of the parties sharing control.

The Company's investments in its subsidiaries, associates and joint ventures are accounted at cost less impairment.

Impairment of investments

The Company reviews its carrying value of investments carried at cost annually, or more frequently when there is indication for impairment. If the recoverable amount is less than its carrying amount, the impairment loss is recorded in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

When an impairment loss subsequently reverses, the carrying amount of the Investment is increased to the revised estimate of its recoverable amount, so that the increased carrying amount does not exceed the cost of the Investment. A reversal of an impairment loss is recognised immediately in Statement of Profit or Loss.

c) Property, plant and equipment ('PPE')

Recognition and measurement

Property, Plant & Equipment are stated at cost, net of accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses, if any. Cost of an item of PPE comprises its purchase price, including import duties and non-refundable purchase taxes, after deducting trade discounts and rebates, any directly attributable cost of bringing the item to its working condition for its intended use. The cost of a self-constructed item of property, plant and equipment comprises the cost of materials and direct labour, any other costs directly attributable to bringing the item to working condition for its intended use, and estimated costs of dismantling and removing the item and restoring the site on which it is located. If significant parts of an item of property, plant and equipment have different useful lives, then they are accounted for as separate items (major components) of property, plant and equipment.

Capital work-in-progress is stated at cost, net of accumulated impairment loss, if any. Property, plant and equipment are

stated at cost of acquisition or construction which includes capitalised finance costs less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment loss, if any.

Recognition criteria

The cost of an item of property, plant and equipment is recognised as an asset if and only if,

- (a) It is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the entity, and
- (b) The cost of the item can be measured reliably.

Capital work-in-progress comprises the cost of property, plant and equipment that are not ready for their intended use at the reporting date, net of accumulated impairment loss, if any. Advances paid towards acquisition of PPE outstanding at each balance sheet date, are shown under other non-current assets.

Any gain or loss on disposal of an item of property, plant and equipment is recognised in the statement of profit or loss.

Subsequent expenditure

Subsequent expenditure is capitalised only if it is probable that the future economic benefits associated with the expenditure will flow to the Company and its cost can be measured reliably with the carrying amount of the replaced part getting derecognised.

Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated on cost of items of PPE less their estimated residual values over their estimated useful lives using the straight-line method and is recognised in the statement of profit and loss.

The management basis its past experience and technical assessment has estimated the useful lives, which is at variance with the life prescribed in Schedule II to the Companies Act, 2013 and has accordingly, depreciated the assets over such useful lives.

Depreciation on improvements carried out on buildings taken on lease is provided for the lease term or useful life of assets, whichever is lower. Refer lease policy under section of leases below for period of leases.

On an item of property, plant and equipment discarded during the year, accelerated depreciation is provided upto the date on which such item of property, plant and equipment is discarded.

Depreciation method, useful lives and residual values are reviewed at each financial year-end and adjusted if appropriate.

Depreciation on additions (disposal) is provided on a pro-rata basis i.e. from (upto) the date on which asset is ready for use (disposed of).

Derecognition

An item of property, plant and equipment is derecognised upon disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected from its use and disposal. Any gain or loss arising on derecognition of the asset is measured as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset and is recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

d) Intangible assets

Acquired Intangible

Intangible assets that are acquired by the Company are measured initially at cost. Cost of an item of Intangible asset comprises its purchase price, including import duties and non-refundable purchase taxes, after deducting trade discounts and rebates, any directly attributable cost of bringing the item to its working condition for its intended use. After initial recognition, an intangible asset is carried at its cost less any /accumulated amortisation and any accumulated impairment loss.

Amortisation

Amortisation is calculated to write off the cost of intangible assets over their estimated useful lives using the straight-line method and is included in depreciation and amortisation expense in statement of profit and loss. The estimated useful life of Computer Software (ERP), Business Intelligence software, Application and Website is 6 years.

Intangible assets with indefinite useful lives such as Brands are not amortised, but are tested for impairment annually. The assessment of indefinite life is reviewed annually to determine whether the indefinite life continues to be supportable. If not, the change in useful life from indefinite to finite is made on a prospective basis.

Amortisation method, useful life and residual values are reviewed at the end of each financial year and adjusted if appropriate.

Derecognition

Intangible assets are derecognised on disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected from its use and disposal. Any gain or loss arising upon derecognition of the asset (calculated as the difference between the net

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disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset) is included in the statement of profit and loss when the asset is derecognised.

Research and development costs

Research costs are expensed as incurred. Development expenditures on an individual project are recognised as an intangible asset when the Company can demonstrate:

- The technical feasibility of completing the intangible asset so that the asset will be available for use or sale
- Its intention to complete and its ability and intention to use or sell the asset
- How the asset will generate future economic benefits
- The availability of resources to complete the asset

The ability to measure reliably the expenditure during development

Following initial recognition of the development expenditure as an asset, the asset is carried at cost less any accumulated amortisation and accumulated impairment losses. Amortisation of the asset begins when development is complete, and the asset is available for use. It is amortised over the period of expected future benefit. Amortisation expense is recognised in the statement of profit and loss unless such expenditure forms part of carrying value of another asset. During the period of development, the asset is tested for impairment annually.

e) Inventories

Inventories is valued at cost or net realisable value, whichever is lower. Cost is determined using the specific identification method and includes all cost incurred in bringing the inventories to their present location and condition, including non-recoverable duties and taxes. Net realisable value represents the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business, less the estimated costs necessary to make the sale. The comparison between cost and net realisable value was performed on an item-by-item basis.

During the year ended March 31, 2025, the Company had changed its method of inventory valuation from the weighted average cost method to the specific identification method with effect from June 1, 2024, to ensure consistency with the system implementation date relating to inventory tracking and valuation. Accordingly, inventories purchased on or after this date were valued on an item-by-item basis. This change was made considering the nature of the Company's business in high-value luxury goods with unique identifiers, where the specific identification method provided more reliable and relevant information.

Based on management's assessment, the aforesaid change in accounting policy did not have a material impact on the

financial statements for the year ended March 31, 2025 and was also not material for the previous year.

f) Retirement and other employee benefits

Short-term employee benefits

Short-term employee benefit obligations are measured on an undiscounted basis and are expensed as the related service is provided. A liability is recognised for the amount expected to be paid e.g., salaries and wages and bonus etc., if the Company has a present legal or constructive obligation to pay this amount as a result of past service provided by the employee, and the amount of obligation can be estimated reliably.

Post-employment benefits

Defined contribution plans

A defined contribution plan is a post-employment benefit plan under which an entity pays specified contributions to a separate entity and will have no legal or constructive obligation to pay further amounts. The Company makes specified monthly contributions towards employee provident fund and employee state insurance scheme ('ESI') to Government administered scheme which is a defined contribution plan. The Company's contribution is recognised as an expense in the Statement of Profit and Loss during the period in which the employee renders the related service.

Defined benefit plans

A defined benefit plan is a post-employment benefit plan other than a defined contribution plan. Gratuity is a defined benefit plan. The administration of the gratuity scheme has been entrusted to the Life Insurance Corporation of India ('LIC'). The Company's net obligation in respect of gratuity is calculated separately by estimating the amount of future benefit that employees have earned in the current and prior periods, discounting that amount and deducting the fair value of any plan assets.

The calculation of defined benefit obligation is performed annually by a qualified actuary using the projected unit credit method.

Re-measurements of the net defined benefit liability i.e. Gratuity, which comprise actuarial gains and losses are recognised in Other Comprehensive Income (OCI). Remeasurements are not reclassified to profit or loss in subsequent periods. The Company determines the net interest expense (income) on the net defined benefit liability for the period by applying the discount rate used to measure the defined benefit obligation at the beginning of the annual period to the then- net defined benefit liability, taking into account any changes in the net defined benefit liability during the period as a result of contributions and benefit payments. Net interest expense and other expenses related to defined benefit plans are recognised in the Statement of Profit or Loss.

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When the benefits of a plan are changed or when a plan is curtailed, the resulting change in benefit that relates to past service ('past service cost' or 'past service gain') or the gain or loss on curtailment is recognised immediately in the statement of profit or loss. The Company recognises gains and losses on the settlement of a defined benefit plan when the settlement occurs.

Compensated absences

The Company's net obligation in respect of long-term employee benefits other than post-employment benefits is the amount of future benefit that employees have earned in return for their service in the current and prior periods; that benefit is discounted to determine its present value, and the fair value of any related assets is deducted. Such obligation such as those related to compensated absences is measured on the basis of an annual independent actuarial valuation using the projected unit cost credit method. Remeasurements gains or losses are recognised in profit or loss in the period in which they arise. The Company presents the leave liability as a current liability in the balance sheet; to the extent it does not have an unconditional right to defer its settlement for 12 months after the reporting date. Where Company has the unconditional legal and contractual right to defer the settlement for a period beyond 12 months, the same is presented as non-current liability.

g) Provisions

A provision is recognised if, as a result of a past event, the Company has a present legal or constructive obligation that can be estimated reliably, and it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation. Provisions are determined by discounting the expected future cash flows (representing the best estimate of the expenditure required to settle the present obligation at the balance sheet date) at a pre-tax rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the liability. The unwinding of the discount is recognised as finance cost. Expected future losses are not provided for.

h) Financial guarantee contracts

Financial guarantee contracts are recognised as a deemed equity contribution if no premium was paid when guarantee is received. Deemed equity contribution is initially measured at fair value.

The fair value of financial guarantees is determined as the present value of the difference in net cash flows between the contractual payments under the debt instrument and the payments that would be required without the guarantee, or the estimated amount that would be payable to a third party for assuming the obligations.

i) Contingent liabilities and contingent assets

A contingent liability exists when there is a possible but not probable obligation, or a present obligation that may, but probably will not, require an outflow of resources, or a present obligation whose amount cannot be estimated reliably. Contingent liabilities do not warrant provisions but are disclosed unless the possibility of outflow of resources is remote.

Contingent assets usually arise from unplanned or other unexpected events that give rise to the possibility of an inflow of economic benefits to the entity. Contingent assets are recognized when the realisation of income is virtually certain, then the related asset is not a contingent asset and its recognition is appropriate.

A contingent asset is disclosed where an inflow of economic benefits is probable.

j) Commitments

Commitments include the amount of purchase order (net of advances) issued to parties for completion of assets. Provisions, contingent liabilities, contingent assets and commitments are reviewed at each reporting date.

k) Revenue from contract with customers

The Company earns revenue primarily from retail trading of premium and luxury watches, accessories and other luxury items and rendering of related after sale services. The Company has concluded that it is the principal in its revenue arrangement because it typically controls goods or services before transferring them to the customers.

Revenue is recognized upon transfer of control of promised products sold or services to customers in an amount that reflects the consideration the Company expects to receive in exchange for those products or services.

At contract inception, the Company assesses its promise to transfer products or services to a customer to identify separate performance obligations. The Company applies judgement to determine whether each product or services promised to a customer are capable of being distinct, and are distinct in the context of the contract, if not, the promised product or services are combined and accounted as a single performance obligation. The Company allocates the arrangement consideration to separately identifiable performance obligation based on their relative stand-alone selling price or residual method. Stand-alone selling prices are determined based on sale prices for the components when it is regularly sold separately, in cases where the Company is unable to determine the stand-alone selling price the Company uses third-party prices for similar deliverables or the Company uses expected cost plus margin approach in estimating the stand-alone selling price.

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The method for recognizing revenues and costs depends on the nature of the products sold and services rendered.

Sale of goods

Revenue on sale of goods are recognized when the customer obtains control of the specified asset. The Company considers whether there are other promises in the contract that are separate performance obligations to which a portion of the transaction price needs to be allocated (e.g. customer loyalty points).

Variable Consideration

If the consideration in a contract includes the variable amount, the Company estimates the amount of consideration to which it will be entitled in exchange for transferring the goods to the customer. The variable consideration is estimated at contract inception and constrained until it is highly probable that a significant revenue reversal in the amount of cumulative revenue recognised will not occur when the associated uncertainty with the variable consideration is subsequently resolved. Some contracts for the sale of goods provide the customers with a right of return the goods within a specified period.

The Company uses the expected value method to estimate the variable consideration given the large number of contracts that have similar characteristics. The Company then applies the requirements on constraining estimates of variable consideration in order to determine the amount of variable consideration that can be included in the transaction price. A refund liability is recognized for the goods that are expected to be returned (i.e., the amount not included in the transaction price). A right of return asset (and corresponding adjustment to cost of sales) is also recognised for the right to recover the goods from a customer.

Right of return assets

A right-of-return asset is recognised for the right to recover the goods expected to be returned by customers. The asset is measured at the former carrying amount of the inventory, less any expected costs to recover the goods and any potential decreases in value. The Company updates the measurement of the asset recorded for any revisions to its expected level of returns, as well as any additional decreases in the value of the returned products.

Refund liabilities

A refund liability is recognised for the obligation to refund some or all of the consideration received (or receivable) from the customer. The Company's refund liabilities arise from customers' right of return. The Company updates its estimates of refund liabilities (and the corresponding change in the transaction price) at the end of each reporting period.

Customer loyalty programmes

For customer loyalty programmes, the transaction price in respect of initial sale is allocated between the award credits and the other components of the sale. The amount allocated to award credits is deferred and is recognised as revenue when the award credits are redeemed and the Company has fulfilled its obligations to supply the discounted products under the terms of the programme or when it is no longer probable that the award credits will be redeemed.

Sale of services

Revenue from services rendered is recognised in profit or loss as they are rendered based on agreements/ arrangements with the concerned parties, and recognised net of goods and services tax/ applicable taxes at the time of completion of service.

Contract balances

Trade Receivable

A receivable is recognised if an amount of consideration that is unconditional (i.e., only the passage of time is required before payment of the consideration is due). Refer to accounting policies of financial assets in Section of Financial instruments – initial recognition and subsequent measurement.

Contract liabilities

A contract liability is recognised if a payment is received or a payment is due (whichever is earlier) from a customer before the Company transfers the related goods or services. Contract liabilities are recognised as revenue when the Company performs under the contract (i.e., transfers control of the related goods or services to the customer).

I) Recognition of interest income or expense

Interest income or expense is recognised using the effective interest method.

The 'effective interest rate' is the rate that exactly discounts the estimated future cash payments or receipts through the expected life of the financial instrument to:

- The gross carrying amount of the financial asset; or
- The amortised cost of the financial liability.

In calculating interest income and expense, the effective interest rate is applied to the gross carrying amount of the asset (when the asset is not credit-impaired) or to the amortised cost of the liability. However, for financial assets that have become credit-impaired subsequent to initial recognition, interest income is calculated by applying the effective interest rate to the amortised cost of the financial asset. If the asset is no longer credit-impaired, then the calculation of interest income reverts to the gross basis.

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m) Borrowing costs

Borrowing costs are interest and other costs (including exchange differences arising from foreign currency borrowings to the extent that they are regarded as an adjustment to interest costs) incurred by the Company in connection with the borrowing of funds. Borrowing costs directly attributable to acquisition or construction of an asset which necessarily take a substantial period of time to get ready for their intended use are capitalized as a part of cost of the asset. Other borrowing costs are recognised as an expense in the period in which they are incurred. Borrowing cost also includes exchange differences to the extent regarded as an adjustment to the borrowing costs.

n) Taxes

Income tax expenses comprises of current and deferred tax. It is recognised in profit or loss except to the extent that it relates to a business combination or an item recognised directly in equity or in other comprehensive income.

Current tax

Current tax comprises the expected tax payable or receivable on the taxable income or loss for the year and any adjustment to the tax payable or receivable in respect of previous years. The amount of current tax reflects the best estimate of the tax amount expected to be paid or received after considering the uncertainty, if any, related to income taxes. It is measured using tax rates (and tax laws) enacted or substantively enacted by the reporting date.

Current tax assets and current tax liabilities are offset only if there is a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts, and it is intended to realise the asset and settle the liability on a net basis or simultaneously.

Current income tax relating to items recognized outside profit or loss is recognized outside profit or loss (either in other comprehensive income (OCI) or in equity). Current tax items are recognized in correlation to the underlying transaction either in OCI or directly in equity. Management periodically evaluates positions taken in the tax returns with respect to situations in which applicable tax regulations are subject to interpretation and considers whether it is probable that a taxation authority will accept an uncertain tax treatment. The Company shall reflect the effect of uncertainty for each uncertain tax treatment by using either most likely method or expected value method, depending on which method predicts better resolution of the treatment.

Deferred tax

Deferred tax is provided using the liability method on temporary differences between the carrying amounts of the assets and liabilities for financial reporting purposes and the corresponding amounts used for taxation purposes.

Deferred tax liabilities are recognized for all temporary differences, except when the deferred tax liability arises from the initial recognition of goodwill or an asset or liability in a transaction that is not a business combination and, at the time of the transaction, affects neither the accounting profit nor taxable profit or loss and does not give rise to equal taxable and deductible temporary differences and in respect of taxable temporary differences associated with investments in subsidiaries, associates and interests in joint ventures, when the timing of the reversal of the temporary differences can be controlled and it is probable that the temporary differences will not reverse in the foreseeable future.

Deferred tax assets are recognised for all deductible temporary differences, the carry forward of unused tax credits and any unused tax losses. Deferred tax assets are recognised to the extent that it is probable that taxable profit will be available against which the deductible temporary differences, and the carry forward of unused tax credits and unused tax losses can be utilised, except when the deferred tax asset relating to the deductible temporary difference arises from the initial recognition of an asset or liability in a transaction that is not a business combination and, at the time of the transaction, affects neither the accounting profit nor taxable profit or loss and does not give rise to equal taxable and deductible temporary differences and in respect of deductible temporary differences associated with investments in subsidiaries, associates and interests in joint ventures, deferred tax assets are recognised only to the extent that it is probable that the temporary differences will reverse in the foreseeable future and taxable profit will be available against which the temporary differences can be utilized.

The carrying amount of deferred tax assets is reviewed at each reporting date and reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that sufficient taxable profit will be available to allow all or part of the deferred tax asset to be utilised. Unrecognised deferred tax assets are re-assessed at each reporting date and are recognised to the extent that it has become probable that future taxable profits will allow the deferred tax asset to be recovered.

In assessing the recoverability of deferred tax assets, the Company relies on the same forecast assumptions used elsewhere in the standalone financial statements and in other management reports, which, among other things, reflect the potential impact of climate-related development on the business, such as increased cost of production as a result of measures to reduce carbon emission.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are measured at the tax rates that are expected to apply in the year when the asset is realized or the liability is settled, based on tax rates (and

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tax laws) that have been enacted or substantively enacted at the reporting date.

Deferred tax relating to items recognised outside profit or loss is recognised outside profit or loss (either in other comprehensive income or in equity). Deferred tax items are recognised in correlation to the underlying transaction either in OCI or directly in equity.

Tax benefits acquired as part of a business combination, but not satisfying the criteria for separate recognition at that date, are recognised subsequently if new information about facts and circumstances change. Acquired deferred tax benefits recognised within the measurement period reduce goodwill related to that acquisition if they result from new information obtained about facts and circumstances existing at the acquisition date. If the carrying amount of goodwill is zero, any remaining deferred tax benefits are recognised in OCI/ capital reserve depending on the principle explained for bargain purchase gains. All other acquired tax benefits realised are recognised in profit or loss.

The Company offsets deferred tax assets and deferred tax liabilities if and only if it has a legally enforceable right to set off current tax liabilities and assets and the deferred tax assets and deferred tax liabilities relate to income taxes levied by the same taxation authorities.

Sales tax/Goods and Service Tax (GST) paid on acquisition of assets or on incurring expenses

Expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of sales tax / GST Paid, except:

- When the tax incurred on a purchase of assets or services is not recoverable from the taxation authority, in which case, the tax paid is recognized as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of the expense item, as applicable.
- When receivables and payables are stated with the amount of tax included.

The net amount of tax recoverable from, or payable to, the taxation authority is included as part of receivables or payables in the balance sheet.

o) Leases

The Company assesses at contract inception whether a contract is, or contains, a lease. That is, if the contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset for a period of time in exchange for consideration.

Company as a lessee

The Company applies a single recognition and measurement approach for all leases, except for short-term leases and leases of low-value assets. The Company recognises lease liabilities to make lease payments and right-of-use assets representing the right to use the underlying assets.

Right-of-use assets

The Company recognizes right-of-use assets at the commencement date of the lease (i.e., the date the underlying asset is available for use). Right-of-use assets are measured at cost, less any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses, and adjusted for any remeasurement of lease liabilities. The cost of right-of-use assets includes the amount of lease liabilities recognized, initial direct costs incurred, and lease payments made at or before the commencement date less any lease incentives received. Right-of-use assets are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the shorter of the lease term and the estimated useful lives of the assets, as follows:

- Buildings 2 to 10 years
- Furniture 4 to 10 years

If ownership of the leased asset transfers to the Company at the end of the lease term or the cost reflects the exercise of a purchase option, depreciation is calculated using the estimated useful life of the asset.

The right-of-use assets are also subject to impairment. Refer to the accounting policies in Section Impairment of non-financial assets.

Lease Liabilities

At the commencement date of the lease, the Company recognized lease liabilities measured at the present value of lease payments to be made over the lease term. The lease payments include fixed payments (including in substance fixed payments) less any lease incentives receivable, variable lease payments that depend on an index or a rate, and amounts expected to be paid under residual value guarantees. The lease payments also include the exercise price of a purchase option reasonably certain to be exercised by the Company and payments of penalties for terminating the lease, if the lease term reflects the Company exercising the option to terminate. Variable lease payments that do not depend on an index or a rate are recognized as expenses (unless they are incurred to produce inventories) in the period in which the event or condition that triggers the payment occurs.

In calculating the present value of lease payments, the Company uses its incremental borrowing rate at the lease commencement date because the interest rate implicit in the lease is not readily determinable. After the commencement date, the amount of lease liabilities is increased to reflect the accretion of interest and reduced for the lease payments made. In addition, the carrying amount of lease liabilities is remeasured if there is a modification, a change in the lease term, a change in the lease payments (e.g., changes to future payments resulting from a change in an index or rate used to determine such lease payments) or a change in the assessment of an option to purchase the underlying asset.

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Short-term leases and leases of low-value assets

The Company applies the short-term lease recognition exemption to its short-term leases of machinery and equipment (i.e., those leases that have a lease term of 12 months or less from the commencement date and do not contain a purchase option). It also applies the lease of low-value assets recognition exemption to leases of office equipment that are considered to be low value. Lease payments on short-term leases and leases of low-value assets are recognised as expense on a straight-line basis over the lease term. Lease payments on short-term leases and leases of low-value assets are recognised as expense on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

p) Financial instruments

A Financial instrument is any contract that gives rise to a financial asset of one entity and a financial liability or equity instrument of another entity.

Financial assets

Initial recognition and measurement

Financial assets are classified, at initial recognition, as subsequently measured at amortised cost, fair value through other comprehensive income (OCI), and fair value through profit or loss. The classification of financial assets at initial recognition depends on the financial asset's contractual cash flow characteristics and the Company's business model for managing them. With the exception of trade receivables that do not contain a significant financing component or for which the Company has applied the practical expedient, all financial assets are recognised initially at fair value plus, in the case of financial assets not recorded at fair value through profit or loss, transaction costs that are attributable to the acquisition of the financial asset. Trade receivables that do not contain a significant financing component or for which the Company has applied the practical expedient are measured at the transaction price determined under Ind

AS 115. Refer to the accounting policies in section of Revenue from contracts with customers. In order for a financial asset to be classified and measured at amortised cost or fair value through OCI, it needs to give rise to cash flows that are 'solely payments of principal and interest (SPPI)' on the principal amount outstanding. This assessment is referred to as the SPPI test and is performed at an instrument level. Financial assets with cash flows that are not SPPI are classified and measured at fair value through profit or loss, irrespective of the business model.

The Company's business model for managing financial assets refers to how it manages its financial assets in order to generate cash flows. The business model determines whether cash flows will result from collecting contractual cash flows, selling the financial assets, or both. Financial assets classified and measured at amortised cost are held within a business model with the objective to hold financial assets in order to collect contractual cash flows while

financial assets classified and measured at fair value through OCI are held within a business model with the objective of both holding to collect contractual cash flows and selling.

Purchases or sales of financial assets that require delivery of assets within a time frame established by regulation or convention in the market place (regular way trades) are recognised on the trade date, i.e., the date that the Company commits to purchase or sell the asset.

Subsequent measurement

For purposes of subsequent measurement, financial assets are classified in four categories:

- Debt instruments at amortised cost
- Debt instruments at fair value through other comprehensive income (FVOCI)
- Debt instruments, derivatives and equity instruments at fair value through profit or loss (FVTPL)
- Equity instruments designated at fair value through other comprehensive income (FVOCI)

Debt instruments at amortised cost

A 'debt instrument' is measured at the amortised cost if the asset is held within a business model whose objective is to hold assets for collecting contractual cash flows, and contractual terms of the asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest (SPPI) on the principal amount outstanding.

After initial measurement, such financial assets are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest rate (EIR) method. The effective interest rate is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash payments or receipts through the expected life of the financial instrument to the gross carrying amount of the financial asset or the amortised cost of the financial liability. Amortised cost is calculated by taking into account any discount or premium on acquisition and fees or costs that are an integral part of the EIR. The EIR amortisation is included in other income in the Statement of Profit and Loss. The losses arising from impairment are recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

Debt instrument at FVOCI

A 'debt instrument' is classified as at the FVOCI if the objective of the business model is achieved both by collecting contractual cash flows and selling the financial assets, and the asset's contractual cash flows represent SPPI.

Debt instruments included within the FVOCI category are measured initially as well as at each reporting date at fair value. Fair value movements are recognised in the other comprehensive income (OCI). On derecognition of the asset, cumulative gain or loss previously recognised in OCI is reclassified to the Statement of Profit and Loss. Interest

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earned whilst holding FVTOCI debt instrument is reported as interest income using the EIR method.

Debt instrument at FVTPL

FVTPL is a residual category for debt instruments. Any debt instrument, which does not meet the criteria for categorization as at amortised cost or as FVOCI, is classified as at FVTPL. In addition, at initial recognition, the Company may irrevocably elect to designate a debt instrument, which otherwise meets amortised cost or FVOCI criteria, as at FVTPL. However, such adoption is allowed only if doing so reduces or eliminates a measurement or recognition inconsistency (referred to as 'accounting mismatch').

Debt instruments included within the FVTPL category are measured at fair value with all changes recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

Equity investments

All equity investments in scope of Ind AS 109 are measured at fair value. Equity instruments which are held for trading and contingent consideration recognised by an acquirer in a business combination to which Ind AS 103 applies are classified as at FVTPL. For all other equity instruments, the Company may make an irrevocable adoption to present subsequent changes in the fair value under other comprehensive income subsequent changes in the fair value. The Company makes such adoption on an instrument-by-instrument basis. The classification is made on initial recognition and is irrevocable.

If the Company decides to classify an equity instrument as at FVOCI, then all fair value changes on the instrument, excluding dividends, are recognised in the OCI. There is no recycling of the amounts from OCI to the Profit or Loss, even on sale of investment. However, the Company may transfer the cumulative gain or loss to retained earnings.

Equity instruments included within the FVTPL category are measured at fair value with all changes recognised in the Profit or Loss.

Impairment of financial assets

The Company recognises loss allowances for expected credit loss on financial assets measured at amortised cost. At each reporting date, the Company assesses whether financial assets carried at amortised cost are credit-impaired. A financial asset is 'credit-impaired' when one or more events that have detrimental impact on the estimated future cash flows of the financial assets have occurred.

Evidence that the financial asset is credit-impaired includes the following observable data:

- significant financial difficulty of the borrower or issuer;
- the breach of contract such as a default or being past due for 180 days or more;

- the restructuring of a loan or advance by the Company on terms that the Company would not consider otherwise;
- it is probable that the borrower will enter bankruptcy or other financial re-organisation; or
- the disappearance of active market for a security because of financial difficulties.

The impairment methodology of the company depends on whether there has been a significant increase in credit risk since initial recognition. If credit risk has not increased significantly, twelve month expected credit loss is used to provide for impairment loss, otherwise lifetime expected credit loss is used.

However, only in case of trade receivables, the Company applies the simplified approach which requires expected lifetime losses to be recognised from initial recognition of the receivables.

The presumption under Ind As 109 with reference to significant increases in credit risk since initial recognition (when financial assets are more than 30 days past due), has been rebutted and is not applicable to the Company, as the Company is able to collect a significant portion of its receivables that exceed the due date.

Measurement of expected credit losses

Expected credit losses are a probability-weighted estimate of credit losses. Credit losses are measured as the present value of all cash shortfalls (i.e. difference between the cash flow due to the Company in accordance with the contract and the cash flow that the Company expects to receive).

Presentation of allowance for expected credit losses in the balance sheet

Loss allowance for financial assets measured at the amortised cost is deducted from the gross carrying amount of the assets.

Write-off

The gross carrying amount of a financial asset is written off (either partially or in full) to the extent that there is no realistic prospect of recovery. This is generally the case when the Company determines that the debtors do not have assets or sources of income that could generate sufficient cash flows to repay the amount subject to the write-off. However, financial assets that are written off could still be subject to enforcement activities in order to comply with the Company's procedure for recovery of amounts due.

Derecognition of financial assets

A financial asset (or, where applicable, a part of a financial asset or part of a group of similar financial assets) is primarily derecognized (i.e., removed from the Company's balance sheet) when:

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- The rights to receive cash flows from the asset have expired, or
- The Company has transferred its rights to receive cash flows from the asset or has assumed an obligation to pay the received cash flows in full without material delay to a third party under a 'pass-through' arrangement; and either (a) the Company has transferred substantially all the risks and rewards of the asset, or (b) the Company has neither transferred nor retained substantially all the risks and rewards of the asset, but has transferred control of the asset.

When the Company has transferred its rights to receive cash flows from an asset or has entered into a pass-through arrangement, it evaluates if and to what extent it has retained the risks and rewards of ownership. When it has neither transferred nor retained substantially all of the risks and rewards of the asset, nor transferred control of the asset, the Company continues to recognise the transferred asset to the extent of the Company's continuing involvement. In that case, the Company also recognises an associated liability. The transferred asset and the associated liability are measured on a basis that reflects the rights and obligations that the Company has retained.

Financial liabilities

Initial recognition and measurement

Financial liabilities are classified, at initial recognition, as financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss, loans and borrowings, payables as appropriate.

All financial liabilities are recognised initially at fair value and, in the case of loans and borrowings and payables, net of directly attributable transaction costs.

The Company's financial liabilities include trade and other payables, loans and borrowings including bank overdrafts, financial guarantee contracts and derivative financial instruments.

The Company holds Derivative financial instruments which are initially recognized at fair value on the date the contract is entered into and are subsequently remeasured at fair value at each reporting date. All derivatives are classified as held for trading and are accounted for at fair value through profit or loss (FVTPL), unless they are designated and effective as hedging instruments.

Subsequent measurement

For purposes of subsequent measurement, financial liabilities are classified in two categories:

- Financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss (FVTPL)
- Financial liabilities at amortised cost (loans and borrowings)

A financial liability is classified as at FVTPL if it is classified as held-for-trading, or it is a derivative or it is designated as such on initial recognition. Financial liabilities at FVTPL are measured at fair value and net gains and losses, including any interest expense, are recognised in Statement of Profit and Loss. Other financial liabilities are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Interest expense and foreign exchange gains and losses are recognised in Statement of Profit and Loss. Any gain or loss on derecognition is also recognised in Statement of Profit and Loss.

Derecognition of financial liabilities

A financial liability is derecognised when the obligation under the liability is discharged or cancelled or expires. When an existing financial liability is replaced by another from the same lender on substantially different terms, or the terms of an existing liability are substantially modified, such an exchange or modification is treated as the derecognition of the original liability and the recognition of a new liability. The difference in the respective carrying amounts is recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

Offsetting

Financial assets and financial liabilities are offset and the net amount presented in the Balance Sheet when, and only when, the Company currently has a legally enforceable right to set off the amounts and it intends either to settle them on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

q) Impairment of non-financial assets

The Company's non-financial assets, are reviewed at each reporting date to determine if there is indication of any impairment. If any such indication exists, then the asset's recoverable amount is estimated. For impairment testing, assets that do not generate independent cash flows are grouped together into cash generating units (CGUs). Each CGU represents the smallest group of assets that generate cash inflows that are largely independent of the cash inflows of other assets or CGUs.

The recoverable amount of as CGU (or an individual asset) is the higher of its value in use and fair value less cost to sell. Value in use is based on the estimated future cash flows, discounted to their present value using a pre-tax discount rate that reflects current assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the CGU (or the asset).

The Company's corporate assets (e.g., central office building for providing support to various CGUs) do not generate independent cash inflows. To determine impairment of a corporate asset, recoverable amount is determined for the CGUs to which the corporate asset belongs.

An impairment loss is recognised whenever the carrying amount of an asset or its cash generating unit exceeds its recoverable amount. Impairment losses are recognised in statement of profit or loss. An impairment loss is reversed if there has been a change in the estimates used to determine the recoverable amount. Such a reversal is made only to the extent that the asset's carrying amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined net of depreciation or amortisation, if no impairment loss had been recognised.

r) Foreign currency transactions

Initial recognition

Transactions in foreign currencies are initially recorded by the Company at functional currency spot rates at the date the transaction first qualifies for recognition. However, for practical reasons, the Company uses average rate if the average approximates the actual rate at the date of the transaction.

Measurement at the reporting date

Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated into the functional currency at the exchange rate at the reporting date. Exchange differences arising on settlement or translation of monetary items are recognised in statement of profit and loss with the exception of the following:

Exchange differences arising on monetary items that forms part of a reporting entity's net investment in a foreign operation are recognised in profit or loss in the separate financial statements of the reporting entity or the individual financial statements of the foreign operation, as appropriate. In the financial statements that include the foreign operation and the reporting entity (e.g., consolidated financial statements when the foreign operation is a subsidiary), such exchange differences are recognised initially in OCI. These exchange differences are reclassified from equity to profit or loss on disposal of the net investment.

Exchange differences arising on monetary items that are designated as part of the hedge of the Group's net investment of a foreign operation. These are recognized in OCI until the net investment is disposed of, at which time, the cumulative amount is reclassified to profit or loss.

Tax charges and credits attributable to exchange differences on those monetary items are also recorded in OCI.

Non-monetary assets and liabilities that are measured at fair value in a foreign currency are translated into the functional currency at the exchange rate when the fair value was determined. Non-monetary assets and liabilities that are measured based on historical cost in a foreign currency are translated at the exchange rate at the date of the initial transaction. The gain or loss arising on translation

of non-monetary items measured at fair value is treated in line with the recognition of the gain or loss on the change in fair value of the item (i.e., translation differences on items whose fair value gain or loss is recognised in OCI or profit or loss are also recognised in OCI or profit or loss, respectively).

s) Operating segments

An operating segment is a component of the Company that engages in business activities from which it may earn revenues and incur expenses, including revenues and expenses that relate to transactions with any of the Company's other components, and for which discrete financial information is available. All operating segments' operating results are reviewed regularly by the Company's Chief Executive Officer/Managing Director as Chief Operating Decision Maker (CODM) to make decisions about resources to be allocated to the segments and assess their performance.

t) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalent in the balance sheet comprise cash at banks and on hand and short-term deposits with an original maturity of three months or less, that are readily convertible to a known amount of cash and subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

For the purpose of the statement of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents consist of cash and short-term deposits, as defined above, net of outstanding bank overdrafts as they are considered an integral part of the Company's cash management.

u) Cash flow statement

Cash flows are reported using the indirect method, whereby profit for the period is adjusted for the effects of transactions of a non-cash nature, any deferrals or accruals of past or future operating cash receipts or payments and item of income or expenses associated with investing or financing cash flows. The cash flows from operating, investing and financing activities of the Company are segregated.

v) Earnings per share

Basic earnings/ (loss) per share are calculated by dividing the net profit/ (loss) for the year attributable to equity shareholders of the Company by the weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the year. The weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the year is adjusted for events of bonus issue and share split. For the purpose of calculating diluted earnings/ (loss) per share, the net profit or loss for the year attributable to equity shareholders and the weighted average number of shares outstanding during the year are adjusted for the effects of all dilutive potential equity shares.

w) Measurement of fair values

The Company measures financial instruments, such as, derivatives at fair value at each balance sheet date.

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The fair value measurement is based on the presumption that the transaction to sell the asset or transfer the liability takes place either:

- ▶ 1. In the principal market for the asset or liability, or
- 2. In the absence of a principal market, in the most advantageous market for the asset or liability.

The principal or the most advantageous market must be accessible by the Company.

The fair value of an asset or a liability is measured using the assumptions that market participants would use when pricing the asset or liability, assuming that market participants act in their economic best interest.

A fair value measurement of a non-financial asset takes into account a market participant's ability to generate economic benefits by using the asset in its highest and best use or by selling it to another market participant that would use the asset in its highest and best use.

The Company uses valuation techniques that are appropriate in the circumstances and for which sufficient data are available to measure fair value, maximising the use of relevant observable inputs and minimising the use of unobservable inputs.

All assets and liabilities for which fair value is measured or disclosed in the standalone financial statements are categorised within the fair value hierarchy, described as follows, based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement as a whole:

Level 1 — Quoted (unadjusted) market prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities

Level 2 — Valuation techniques for which the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement is directly or indirectly observable

Level 3 — Valuation techniques for which the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement is unobservable

For assets and liabilities that are recognised in the standalone financial statements on a recurring basis, the Company determines whether transfers have occurred between levels in the hierarchy by re-assessing categorisation (based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement as a whole) at the end of each reporting period.

For the purpose of fair value disclosures, the Company has determined classes of assets and liabilities on the basis of the nature, characteristics and risks of the asset or liability and the level of the fair value hierarchy as explained above.

Further information about the assumptions made in measuring fair values used in preparing these standalone financial statements is included in the respective notes.

2.3 Changes in accounting policies and disclosures

New and amended standards

I. Ind AS 1 (Presentation of Financial Statements): Classification of Liabilities: Clarifies that liabilities are classified as current/non-current based on rights existing at the reporting date, replacing "unconditional right" with "substantive right" to defer settlement.

2.4 Significant accounting judgements, estimates and assumptions

Uncertainty about these assumptions and estimates could result in outcomes that require a material adjustment to the carrying amount of assets or liabilities affected in future periods.

Assumptions and estimation uncertainties

Information about assumptions and estimation uncertainties that have a significant risk of resulting in a material adjustment in the year ended March 31, 2026 is included in the following notes:

a) Defined benefit plans

The present value of the gratuity is determined using actuarial valuations. An actuarial valuation involves making various assumptions that may differ from actual developments in the future. These include the determination of the discount rate, future salary increases and mortality rates. Due to the complexities involved in the valuation and its long-term nature, a defined benefit obligation is highly sensitive to changes in these assumptions. All assumptions are reviewed at each reporting date.

The parameter most subject to change is the discount rate. In determining the appropriate discount rate for plans operated in India, the management considers the interest rates of government bonds in currencies consistent with the currencies of the post-employment benefit obligation. The mortality rate is based on publicly available mortality tables for the specific countries. Those mortality tables tend to change only at interval in response to demographic changes. Future salary increases, and gratuity increases are based on expected future inflation rates for the respective countries.

b) Taxes

Uncertainties exist with respect to the interpretation of complex tax regulations, changes in tax laws, and the amount and timing of future taxable income. Given the wide range of business relationships and the long term nature and complexity of existing contractual agreements, differences arising between the actual results and the assumptions made, or future changes to such assumptions, could necessitate future adjustments to tax income and expense already recorded. The Company establishes provisions, based on reasonable estimates. The amount of such provisions is based on various factors, such as experience of previous tax audits and differing interpretations of tax regulations by the taxable entity and the responsible tax authority. Such differences of interpretation may arise

on a wide variety of issues depending on the conditions prevailing in the respective domicile of the companies. Refer Note 2.2 (n) and 9- Recognition of deferred tax assets: availability of future taxable profit against which tax losses carried forward can be used;

c) Contingencies

Refer Note 35 – Recognition and measurement of provision and contingencies, key assumptions about the likelihood and magnitude of an outflow of resources;

d) Impairment of non-financial assets

Impairment exists when the carrying value of an asset or cash generating unit exceeds its recoverable amount, which is the higher of its fair value less costs of disposal and its value in use. The fair value less costs of disposal calculation is based on available data from binding sales transactions, conducted at arm's length, for similar assets or observable market prices less incremental costs for disposing of the asset. The value in use calculation is based on a DCF model. The cash flows are derived from the budget for the next five years and do not include restructuring activities that the Company is not yet committed to or significant future investments that will enhance the asset's performance of the CGU being tested. The recoverable amount is sensitive to the discount rate used for the DCF model as well as the expected future cash-inflows and the growth rate used for extrapolation purposes. These estimates are most relevant to goodwill and other intangibles with indefinite useful lives recognised by the Group.

Refer Note 2.2 (p)– Impairment test of non-financial assets: key assumptions underlying recoverable amounts;

e) Determining the lease term of contracts with renewal and termination options – Company as lessee:

The key assumptions concerning the future and other key sources of estimation uncertainty at the reporting date, that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year. The Company based its assumptions and estimates on parameters available when the standalone financial statements were prepared. Existing circumstances and assumptions about future developments, however, may change due to market changes or circumstances arising that are beyond the control of the Company. Such changes are reflected in the assumptions when they occur.

Leases – Estimating the incremental borrowing rate: The Company cannot readily determine the interest rate implicit in the lease, therefore, it uses its incremental borrowing rate (IBR) to measure lease liabilities. The IBR is the rate of interest that the Company would have to pay to borrow over a similar term, and with a similar security, the funds necessary to obtain an asset of a similar value to the right-of-use asset in a similar economic environment. The IBR therefore reflects what the Company 'would have to pay',

which requires estimation when no observable rates are available or when they need to be adjusted to reflect the terms and conditions of the lease. The Company estimates the IBR using observable inputs (such as market interest rates) when available and is required to make certain entity-specific estimates.

f) Useful life of Property, plant and equipment and intangibles:

The management estimates the useful life and residual value of property, plant and equipment and other intangible assets. These assumptions are reviewed at each reporting date.

g) Provision for slow and obsolete inventory:

The Company is in business of trading of watches, accessories & luxury items and rendering of related after-sales services and consists of inventory of watches at various stores of the Company. The Company on a periodic basis and at each reporting date assess the inventory age listing to identify slow-moving allowance and obsolete inventories and then estimates the amount of inventory provision. In doing so, it estimates the net realisable value of aged inventory based on current selling price of such/similar aged inventory and likely sales volume based discount offered and past sales trend. Also, the Company reviews catalogues of various brands to verify whether all inventory items are appearing in them.

II. Financial risk management

(i) Risk management framework

The Company's Risk management Committee has overall responsibility for the establishment and oversight of the Company's risk management framework. The Company's risk management policies are established to identify and analyse the risk faced by the Company, to set appropriate risk limits and controls and to monitor risks and adherence to limits. Risk management policies and systems are reviewed regularly to effect changes in market conditions and Company's activities. The Company, through its training and management standards and procedures, aims to maintain discipline and constructive control environment in which all employees understand their roles and obligations.

(ii) Credit risk

Credit risk is the risk of financial loss to the Company if a customer or counterparty to a financial instrument fails to meet its contractual obligations. The carrying amount of financial assets represents the maximum credit risk exposure and arises principally from the Company's receivable from customers and loans.

Trade receivables and Loans

The Company's retail business is pre-dominantly on cash and carry basis which is largely through credit-card collections. The credit risk on such collections is minimal, since they are primarily owned by customers' card issuing banks. The Company has adopted a policy of dealing with only credit worthy counterparties in case of institutional customers and the credit risk exposure for institutional customers is managed by the Company by credit worthiness checks. The Company also carries credit risk on lease deposits with landlords for store properties taken on leases, for which agreements are signed and property possessions timely taken for store operations. The risk relating to refunds after store shut down is managed through successful negotiations or appropriate legal actions, where necessary. The Company's experience of delinquencies and customer disputes have been minimal. Further, Trade and other receivables consist of a large number of customers, across geographies within India, hence, the Company is not exposed to concentration risks.

(iv) Market Risk

a) Product price risk

In a potentially inflationary economy, the Company expects periodical price increases across its retail product lines. Product price increases which are not in line with the levels of customers' discretionary spends, may affect the business/retail sales volumes. Since the Company operates in premium and luxury watch category, the demand is reasonably inelastic to changes in price. However, the Company continually monitors and compares prices of its products in other developed markets as its customers tend to compare prices across markets. In the event that prices deviate significantly unfavourably from the markets, the Company negotiates with its vendor for change of prices. The Company also manages the risk by offering judicious product discounts to retail customers to sustain volumes. The Company negotiates with its vendors for purchase price rebates such that the rebates substantially absorb the product discounts offered to the retail customers. This helps the Company protect itself from significant product margin losses.

b) Interest rate risk

Interest rate sensitivity analysis

The entity has no borrowings as of the reporting date. Consequently, changes in market interest rates do not have a direct impact on the profit or loss, and the interest rate risk is considered minimal"

c) Currency risk

The Company is exposed to currency risk to the extent that there is mismatch between the currencies in which purchases are denominated and the functional currency of the Company. Currencies in the which the Company is exposed to risk are CHF, USD, AED, SGD and EUR. The Company evaluates this risk on a regular basis and appropriate risk mitigating steps are taken, including but not limited, entering into forward contracts.

II. Defined benefit plan - Gratuity

The employees' gratuity fund scheme managed by Life Insurance Corporation of India is a defined benefit plan. The present value of obligation is determined based on actuarial valuation using the Projected Unit Credit Method, which recognises each period of service as giving rise to additional unit of employee benefit entitlement and measures each unit separately to build up the final obligation. The Company made annual contributions to the LIC of India of an amount advised by the LIC.

The above defined benefit plan exposes the Company to following risks:

Interest rate risk:

The defined benefit obligation calculated uses a discount rate based on government bonds. If bond yields fall, the defined benefit obligation will tend to increase.

Demographic risk:

This is the risk of variability of results due to unsystematic nature of decrements that include mortality, withdrawal, disability and retirement. The effect of these decrements on the defined benefit obligation is not straight forward and depends upon the combination of salary increase, discount rate and vesting criteria. It is important not to overstate withdrawals because in the financial analysis the retirement benefit of a short career employee typically costs less per year as compared to a long service employee.

6. The Holding Company's Board of Directors are responsible for the other information. The other information comprises the information included in the Annual Report, but does not include the consolidated financial statements and our auditor's report thereon. The Annual Report is expected to be made available to us after the date of the auditor's report.

Our opinion on the consolidated financial statements does not cover the other information and we will not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with our audit of the consolidated financial statements, our responsibility is to read the other information identified above when it becomes available and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the consolidated financial statements or our knowledge obtained in the audit or otherwise appears to be materially misstated.

When we read the Annual Report, if we conclude that there is a material misstatement therein, we are required to communicate the matter to those charged with governance.

Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Consolidated Financial Statements

7. The accompanying consolidated financial statements have been approved by the Holding Company's Board of Directors. The Holding Company's Board of Directors are responsible for the matters stated in section 134(5) of the Act with respect to the preparation and presentation of these consolidated financial statements that give a true and fair view of the consolidated financial position, consolidated financial performance including other comprehensive income, consolidated changes in equity and consolidated cash flows of the Group including its associates and joint venture in accordance with the Ind AS specified under section 133 of the Act read with the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015, and other accounting principles generally accepted in India. The Holding Company's Board of Directors are also responsible for ensuring accuracy of records including financial information considered necessary for the preparation

of consolidated Ind AS financial statements. Further, in terms of the provisions of the Act the respective Board of Directors of the companies included in the Group, and its associate companies and joint venture company covered under the Act are responsible for maintenance of adequate accounting records in accordance with the provisions of the Act for safeguarding the assets of the Group and for preventing and detecting frauds and other irregularities; selection and application of appropriate accounting policies; making judgments and estimates that are reasonable and prudent; and design, implementation and maintenance of adequate internal financial controls, that were operating effectively for ensuring the accuracy and completeness of the accounting records, relevant to the preparation and presentation of the financial statements that give a true and fair view and are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error. These financial statements have been used for the purpose of preparation of the consolidated financial statements by the Board of Directors of the Holding Company, as aforesaid.

8. In preparing the consolidated financial statements, the respective Board of Directors of the companies included in the Group and of its associates and joint venture are responsible for assessing the ability of the Group and of its associates and joint venture to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the Board of Directors either intends to liquidate the Group or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.
9. Those respective Board of Directors are also responsible for overseeing the financial reporting process of the companies included in the Group and of its associates and joint venture.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Consolidated Financial Statements

10. Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the consolidated financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Standards on Auditing will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered

material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these consolidated financial statements.

11. As part of an audit in accordance with Standards on Auditing specified under section 143(10) of the Act we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the consolidated financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control;
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances. Under section 143(3)(i) of the Act we are also responsible for expressing our opinion on whether the Holding Company has adequate internal financial controls with reference to financial statements in place and the operating effectiveness of such controls.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by management;
- Conclude on the appropriateness of Board of Directors' use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the ability of the Group and its associates and joint venture to continue as a going concern. If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditor's report to the related disclosures in the consolidated financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Group and its associates and joint venture to cease to continue as a going concern;
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the consolidated financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the consolidated financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation; and
- Obtain sufficient appropriate audit evidence regarding the financial information of the entities or business activities within the Group, and its associates and joint venture, to express an opinion on the consolidated financial statements. We are responsible for the direction, supervision and performance of the audit of financial statements of such entities included in the consolidated financial statements, of which we are the independent auditors. For the other entities included in the consolidated financial statements, which have been audited by the other auditors, such other

auditors remain responsible for the direction, supervision and performance of the audits carried out by them. We remain solely responsible for our audit opinion.

12. We communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.
13. We also provide those charged with governance with a statement that we have complied with relevant ethical requirements regarding independence, and to communicate with them all relationships and other matters that may reasonably be thought to bear on our independence, and where applicable, related safeguards.
14. From the matters communicated with those charged with governance, we determine those matters that were of most significance in the audit of the consolidated financial statements of the current period and are therefore the key audit matters. We describe these matters in our auditor's report unless law or regulation precludes public disclosure about the matter or when, in extremely rare circumstances, we determine that a matter should not be communicated in our report because the adverse consequences of doing so would reasonably be expected to outweigh the public interest benefits of such communication.

Other Matter

15. We did not audit the financial statements of 3 subsidiaries, whose financial statements reflect total assets of ₹ 981.14 lakhs as at 31 March 2026, total revenues of ₹ 808.52 lakhs and net cash inflows amounting to ₹ 61.24 lakhs for the year ended on that date, as considered in the consolidated financial statements. The consolidated financial statements also include the Group's share of net loss (including other comprehensive income) of ₹ 418.20 lakhs for the year ended 31 March 2026 in respect of an associate and a joint venture, whose financial statements have not been audited by us. These financial statements have been audited by other auditors whose reports have been furnished to us by the management and our opinion on the consolidated financial statements, in so far as it relates to the amounts and disclosures included in respect of these subsidiaries, associate and joint venture, and our report in terms of sub-section (3) of section 143 of the Act in so far as it relates to the aforesaid subsidiaries, associates and joint venture, are based solely on the reports of the other auditors.

Further, an associate is located outside India whose financial statements and other financial information have been prepared in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in their respective countries and which have been audited by other auditors under generally accepted auditing standards applicable in their respective countries. The Holding Company's management has converted the financial statements of such associate located outside India from accounting principles generally accepted in their respective countries to accounting principles generally accepted in India. We have audited these conversion adjustments made by the Holding Company's management. Our opinion on the consolidated financial statements, in so far as it relates to the amounts and disclosures included in respect of such associate

located outside India, is based on the report of other auditors and the conversion adjustments prepared by the management of the Holding Company and audited by us.

Our opinion above on the consolidated financial statements, and our report on other legal and regulatory requirements below, are not modified in respect of the above matters with respect to our reliance on the work done by and the reports of the other auditors.

16. The consolidated financial statements also include the Group's share of net loss (including other comprehensive income) of ₹ 0.90 lakhs for the year ended 31 March 2026 in respect of an associate, whose financial information have not been audited by us. This financial statement is unaudited and has been furnished to us by the management and our opinion on the consolidated financial statements, in so far as it relates to the amounts and disclosures included in respect of the aforesaid associate, is based solely on such unaudited financial statements. In our opinion and according to the information and explanations given to us by the management, this financial statement is not material to the Group.

Our opinion above on the consolidated financial statements, and our report on other legal and regulatory requirements below, are not modified in respect of the above matter with respect to our reliance on the financial statements certified by the management.

Report on Other Legal and Regulatory Requirements

17. As required by section 197(16) of the Act, based on our audit and on the consideration of the reports of the other auditors, referred to in paragraph 15, on separate financial statements of the subsidiaries, associates and joint ventures, we report that the Holding Company incorporated in India whose financial statements have been audited under the Act have paid remuneration to their respective directors during the year in accordance with the provisions of and limits laid down under section 197 read with Schedule V to the Act. Further, we report that two subsidiaries and a joint venture incorporated in India whose financial statements have been audited under the Act have not paid or provided for any managerial remuneration during the year. Accordingly, reporting under section 197(16) of the Act is not applicable in respect of such subsidiaries and joint venture.
18. As required by clause (xxi) of paragraph 3 of Companies (Auditor's Report) Order, 2020 ('the Order') issued by the Central Government of India in terms of section 143(11) of the Act based on the consideration of the Order reports issued by us and by the respective other auditors as mentioned in paragraph 15 above, of companies included in the consolidated financial statements and covered under the Act we report that there are no qualifications or adverse remarks reported in the respective Order reports of such companies.
19. As required by section 143(3) of the Act, based on our audit and on the consideration of the reports of the other auditors on separate financial statements and other financial information of the subsidiaries, associates and joint venture incorporated in India whose financial statements have been audited under the Act, we report, to the extent applicable, that:
 - a) We have sought and obtained all the information and explanations which to the best of our knowledge and belief

were necessary for the purpose of our audit of the aforesaid consolidated financial statements;

- b) In our opinion, proper books of account as required by law relating to preparation of the aforesaid consolidated financial statements have been kept so far as it appears from our examination of those books and the reports of the other auditors;
- c) The consolidated financial statements dealt with by this report are in agreement with the relevant books of account maintained for the purpose of preparation of the consolidated financial statements;
- d) In our opinion, the aforesaid consolidated financial statements comply with Ind AS specified under section 133 of the Act read with the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015;
- e) On the basis of the written representations received from the directors of the Holding Company, and taken on record by the Board of Directors of the Holding Company, and the reports of the statutory auditors of its subsidiaries and joint venture, covered under the Act, none of the directors of the Holding Company, its subsidiaries and joint venture, are disqualified as on 31 March 2026 from being appointed as a director in terms of section 164(2) of the Act;
- f) With respect to the adequacy of the internal financial controls with reference to financial statements of the Holding Company, and its subsidiary, associates and joint venture covered under the Act, and the operating effectiveness of such controls, refer to our separate report in 'Annexure I' wherein we have expressed an unmodified opinion; and
- g) With respect to the other matters to be included in the Auditor's Report in accordance with rule 11 of the Companies (Audit and Auditors) Rules, 2014 (as amended), in our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us and based on the consideration of the report of the other auditors on separate financial statements and other financial information of the subsidiaries, associates and joint venture incorporated in India whose financial statements have been audited under the Act:
 - i. The consolidated financial statements disclose the impact of pending litigations on the consolidated financial position of the Group, its associates and joint venture as detailed in Note 36 to the consolidated financial statements;
 - ii. The Holding Company, its subsidiaries, associates and joint venture did not have any long-term contracts including derivative contracts for which there were any material foreseeable losses as at 31 March 2026;
 - iii. There were no amounts which were required to be transferred to the Investor Education and Protection Fund by the Holding Company, and its subsidiaries, associates and joint venture covered under the Act, during the year ended 31 March 2026;

- iv. a. The respective managements of the Holding Company and its subsidiaries, associates and joint venture incorporated in India whose financial statements have been audited under the Act have represented to us and the other auditors of such subsidiaries, associates and joint venture respectively that, to the best of their knowledge and belief, as disclosed in note 46(5) to the consolidated financial statements, no funds have been advanced or loaned or invested (either from borrowed funds or securities premium or any other sources or kind of funds) by the Holding Company or its subsidiaries, associates and joint venture to or in any persons or entities, including foreign entities ('the intermediaries'), with the understanding, whether recorded in writing or otherwise, that the intermediary shall, whether, directly or indirectly lend or invest in other persons or entities identified in any manner whatsoever by or on behalf of the Holding Company, or any such subsidiaries, associates and joint venture ('the Ultimate Beneficiaries') or provide any guarantee, security or the like on behalf the Ultimate Beneficiaries;
- b. The respective managements of the Holding Company and its subsidiaries, associates and joint venture incorporated in India whose financial statements have been audited under the Act have represented to us and the other auditors of such subsidiaries, associates and joint venture respectively that, to the best of their knowledge and belief, as disclosed in the note 46(6) to the accompanying consolidated financial statements, no funds have been received by the Holding Company or its subsidiaries, associates and joint venture from any persons or entities, including foreign entities ('the Funding Parties'), with the understanding, whether recorded in writing or otherwise, that the Holding Company, or any such subsidiaries, and joint venture shall, whether directly or indirectly, lend or invest in other persons or entities identified in any manner whatsoever by or on behalf of the Funding Party ('Ultimate Beneficiaries') or provide any guarantee, security or the like on behalf of the Ultimate Beneficiaries; and
- c. Based on such audit procedures performed by us and that performed by the auditors of the subsidiaries, associates and joint venture, as considered reasonable and appropriate in the circumstances, nothing has come to our or other auditors' notice that has caused us or the other auditors to believe that the management representations under sub-clauses (a) and (b) above contain any material misstatement.
- v. The Holding Company, its subsidiaries, associates and joint venture have not declared or paid any dividend during the year ended 31 March 2026.
- vi. As stated in note 53 to the consolidated financial statements and based on our examination which included test checks and that performed by the respective auditors of the subsidiaries and joint venture, of the Holding Company which are companies incorporated in India and audited under the Act, the Holding Company and its subsidiaries and joint venture, in respect of financial year commencing on 1 April 2025 to 31 March 2026, have used an accounting softwares for maintaining their books of account which have a feature of recording audit trail (edit log) facility and the same have been operated throughout the year for all relevant transactions recorded in the softwares. Further, during the course of our audit we and respective auditors of the above referred subsidiaries and joint venture did not come across any instance of audit trail feature being tampered with. Furthermore, the audit trails have been preserved by the Holding Company and above referred subsidiaries and joint venture as per the statutory requirements for record retention.

1. The internal financial controls with reference to consolidated financial statements in so far as it relates to such joint venture company have been audited by other auditors whose report has been furnished to us by the management and our report on the adequacy and operating effectiveness of the internal financial controls with reference to consolidated financial statements for the Holding Company and a joint venture company, as aforesaid, under Section 143(3)(i) of the Act in so far as it relates to such subsidiary companies and joint venture companies is based solely on the reports of the auditors of such companies. Notes to the Consolidated Financial Statements for the year ended March 31, 2026

1. Corporate Information

Ethos Limited ('the Company' or the Parent Company), is a public limited company domiciled in India and was incorporated on 05 November 2007 under the provisions of the Companies Act applicable in India. Its shares are listed on two recognised stock exchanges in India. These consolidated financial statements comprise the Company, its subsidiaries (referred to collectively as the "Group"), its associates and its joint venture. The registered office of the Company is located at Plot No. 3, Sector III, Parwanoo, Himachal Pradesh. The Corporate Identification Number of parent company is L52300HP2007PLC030800.

The Group's business consists of retail trading of premium and luxury watches, accessories and other luxury items, marketing and support services and rendering of related after sale services.

Information on the Group's structure is provided in Note 2.2. Information on other related party relationships of the Group is provided in Note 38.

The consolidated financial statements were approved for issue in accordance with a resolution of the directors on May 12, 2026.

2. Material Accounting policy information

2.1 Basis of preparation

These consolidated financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Indian Accounting Standards (Ind AS) as per the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 (as amended from time to time) and presentation requirements of Division II of Schedule III to the Companies Act, 2013 (Ind AS compliant Schedule III).

The accounting policies have been consistently applied except where a newly issued accounting standard is initially adopted or a revision to an existing accounting standard requires a change in the accounting policy hitherto in use.

The consolidated financial statements provide comparative information in respect of the corresponding previous year.

The Group's consolidated financial statements are presented in Indian Rupees, which is also the parent company's functional currency. For each entity the Group determines the functional currency and items included in the financial statements of each entity are measured using that functional currency. These consolidated financial statements are presented in Indian rupees. All amounts have been rounded-off to the nearest lakhs, up to two places of decimal, unless otherwise indicated.

Basis of measurement

The consolidated financial statements have been prepared on a historical cost convention on accrual basis, except for certain assets and liabilities that are measured at fair values at the end of each reporting period, as explained in the accounting policies below.

The Group has prepared the financial statements on the basis that it will continue to operate as a going concern.

2.2 Basis of Consolidation

The consolidated financial statements comprises the financial statement of the Company, and the entities controlled by the Group including its subsidiaries as at March 31, 2026. Control is achieved when the Group is exposed, or has rights, to variable returns from its involvement with the investee and has the ability to affect those returns through its power over the investee.

Specifically, the Group controls an investee if and only if the Group has:

- Power over the investee (i.e. existing rights that give it the current ability to direct the relevant activities of the investee)
- Exposure, or rights, to variable returns from its involvement with the investee, and
- The ability to use its power over the investee to affects its returns.

Generally, there is a presumption that a majority of voting rights result in control. To support this presumption and when the Group has less than a majority of the voting or similar rights of an investee, the Group considers all relevant facts and circumstances in assessing whether it has power over an investee, including:

- The contractual arrangement with the other vote holders of the investee.
- Rights arising from other contractual arrangements.
- The Group's voting rights and potential voting rights.
- The size of the group's holding of voting rights relative to the size and dispersion of the holdings of the other voting holders.

The Group re-assesses whether or not it controls an investee if facts and circumstances indicate that there are changes to one or more of the three elements of control. Consolidation of a subsidiary begins when the Group obtains control over the subsidiary and ceases when the Group loses control of the subsidiary. Assets, liabilities, income and expenses of a subsidiary acquired or disposed of during the year are included in the consolidated financial statements from the date the Group gains control until the date the Group ceases to control the subsidiary.

Consolidated financial statements are prepared using uniform accounting policies for like transactions and other events in similar circumstances. If a member of the Group uses accounting policies other than those adopted in the consolidated financial statements for like transactions and events in similar circumstances, appropriate adjustments are made to that Group member's financial statements in preparing the consolidated financial statements to ensure conformity with the Group's accounting policies.

The financial statements of all entities used for the purpose of consolidation are drawn up to same reporting date as that of the parent company, i.e., year ended on 31 March 2026. When the end of the reporting period of the parent is different from that of a subsidiary, the subsidiary prepares, for consolidation purposes, additional financial information as of the same date as the financial statements of the parent to enable the parent to consolidate the financial information of the subsidiary, unless it is impracticable to do so.

Consolidation procedure:

- Combine like items of assets, liabilities, equity, income, expenses and cash flows of the parent with those of its subsidiaries. For this purpose, income and expenses of the subsidiary are based on the amounts of the assets and liabilities recognised in the special purpose interim condensed consolidated financial statements at the acquisition date.
- Offset (eliminate) the carrying amount of the parent's investment in each subsidiary and the parent's portion of equity of each subsidiary.

- Eliminate in full intragroup assets and liabilities, equity, income, expenses and cash flows relating to transactions between entities of the group (profits or losses resulting from intragroup transactions that are recognised in assets, such as inventory and property, plant and equipment, are eliminated in full). Intragroup losses may indicate an impairment that requires recognition in the special purpose interim condensed consolidated financial statements. Ind AS 12 Income Taxes applies to temporary differences that arise from the elimination of profits and losses resulting from intragroup transactions.

Profit or loss and each component of other comprehensive income (OCI) are attributed to the equity holders of the parent of the Group and to the non-controlling interests, even if this results in the non-controlling interests having a deficit balance. When necessary, adjustments are made to the financial statements of subsidiaries to bring their accounting policies into line with the Group's accounting policies. All intra-group assets and liabilities, equity, income, expenses and cash flows relating to transactions between members of the Group are eliminated in full on consolidation.

A change in the ownership interest of a subsidiary, without a loss of control, is accounted for as an equity transaction.

If the Group loses control over a subsidiary, it:

- Derecognises the assets (including goodwill) and liabilities of the subsidiary at their carrying amounts at the date when control is lost.
- Derecognises the carrying amount of any non-controlling interests.
- Derecognises the cumulative translation differences recorded in equity.
- Recognises the fair value of the consideration received.
- Recognises the fair value of any investment retained.
- Recognises any surplus or deficit in profit or loss.
- Recognise that distribution of shares of subsidiary to Group in Group's capacity as owners.
- Reclassifies the parent's share of components previously recognised in OCI to profit or loss or transferred directly to retained earnings, if required by other Ind ASs as would be required if the Group had directly disposed of the related assets or liabilities.

2.3 Summary of material accounting policies

a. Investment in Joint Venture and Associates

The group holds an interest in a joint venture, Pasadena Retail Private Limited, and an interest in associates, Silvercity Brands AG and Favre Leuba GmbH.

An associate is an entity over which the Group has significant influence. Significant influence is the power to participate in the financial and operating policy decisions of the investee but is not control or joint control over those policies.

A joint venture is a type of joint arrangement whereby the parties that have joint control of the arrangement have rights to the net assets of the joint venture. Joint control is the contractually agreed sharing of control of an arrangement, which exists only when decisions about the relevant activities require unanimous consent of the parties sharing control.

The considerations made in determining whether significant influence or joint control are similar to those necessary to determine control over the subsidiaries.

The Group's investments in its associates and joint venture are accounted for using the equity method. Under the equity method, the investment in an associate or a joint venture is initially recognised at cost. The carrying amount of the investment is adjusted to recognise changes in the Group's share of net assets of the associate or joint venture since the acquisition date. Goodwill relating to the associate or joint venture is included in the carrying amount of the investment

and is not tested for impairment individually. Thus, reversals of impairments may effectively include reversal of goodwill impairments. Impairments and reversals are presented within 'Share of profit of an associate and a joint venture' in the statement of profit or loss.

The statement of profit and loss reflects the Group's share of the results of operations of the associate or joint venture. Any change in OCI of those investees is presented as part of the Group's OCI. In addition, when there has been a change recognised directly in the equity of the associate or joint venture, the Group recognises its share of any changes, when applicable, in the statement of changes in equity. Unrealised gains and losses resulting from transactions between the Group and the associate or joint venture are eliminated to the extent of the interest in the associate or joint venture.

If an entity's share of losses of an associate or a joint venture equals or exceeds its interest in the associate or joint venture (which includes any long-term interest that, in substance, form part of the Group's net investment in the associate or joint venture), the entity discontinues recognising its share of further losses. Additional losses are recognised only to the extent that the Group has incurred legal or constructive obligations or made payments on behalf of the associate or joint venture. If the associate or joint venture subsequently reports profits, the entity resumes recognising its share of those profits only after its share of the profits equals the share of losses not recognised.

The aggregate of the Group's share of profit or loss of an associate and a joint venture is shown on the face of the statement of profit and loss outside the operating profit.

The financial statements of the associate or joint venture are prepared for the same reporting period as the Group. When necessary, adjustments are made to bring the accounting policies in line with those of the Group.

After application of the equity method, the Group determines whether it is necessary to recognise an impairment loss on its investment in its associate or joint venture. At each reporting date, the Group determines whether there is objective evidence that the investment in the associate or joint venture is impaired. If there is such evidence, the Group calculates the amount of impairment as the difference between the recoverable amount of the associate or joint venture and its carrying value, and then recognises the loss as 'Share of profit of an associate and a joint venture' in the statement of profit and loss.

Upon loss of significant influence over the associate or loss of joint control over the joint venture, the Group measures and recognises any retained investment at its fair value. Any difference between the carrying amount of the associate or joint venture upon loss of significant influence or loss of joint control and the fair value of the retained investment and proceeds from disposal is recognised in profit or loss.

b. Current versus non-current classification

Based on the time involved between the acquisition of assets for processing and their realization in cash and cash equivalents, the Group has identified twelve months as its operating cycle for determining current and non-current classification of assets and liabilities in the balance sheet.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are classified as non-current assets and liabilities.

c. Property, plant and equipment ('PPE')

Recognition and measurement

Property, Plant & Equipment are stated at cost, net of accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses, if any. Cost of an item of PPE comprises its purchase price, including import duties and non-refundable purchase taxes, after deducting trade discounts and rebates, any directly attributable cost of bringing the item to its working condition for its intended use. The cost of a self-constructed item of property, plant and equipment comprises the cost of materials and direct labour, any other costs directly attributable to bringing the item to working condition for its intended use, and estimated costs of dismantling and removing the item and restoring the site on which it is located. If significant parts of an item of property, plant and equipment have different useful lives, then they are accounted for as separate items (major components) of property, plant and equipment.

Capital work-in-progress is stated at cost, net of accumulated impairment loss, if any. Property, plant and equipment are stated at cost of acquisition or construction which includes capitalised finance costs less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment loss, if any.

Recognition criteria

The cost of an item of property, plant and equipment is recognised as an asset if and only if,

- It is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the entity, and
- The cost of the item can be measured reliably.

Capital work-in-progress comprises the cost of property, plant and equipment that are not ready for their intended use at the reporting date, net of accumulated impairment loss, if any. Advances paid towards acquisition of PPE outstanding at each balance sheet date, are shown under other non-current assets.

Any gain or loss on disposal of an item of property, plant and equipment is recognised in the statement of profit or loss.

Subsequent expenditure

Subsequent expenditure is capitalised only if it is probable that the future economic benefits associated with the expenditure will flow to the Group and its cost can be

measured reliably with the carrying amount of the replaced part getting derecognised.

Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated on cost of items of PPE less their estimated residual values over their estimated useful lives using the straight-line method and is recognised in the statement of profit and loss.

The management basis its past experience and technical assessment has estimated the useful lives, which is at variance with the life prescribed in Schedule II to the Companies Act, 2013 and has accordingly, depreciated the assets over such useful lives.

On an item of property, plant and equipment discarded during the year, accelerated depreciation is provided considered life reassessment if store is due for closure upto the date on which such item of property, plant and equipment is discarded.

Depreciation method, useful lives and residual values are reviewed at each financial year-end and adjusted if appropriate.

Depreciation on additions (disposal) is provided on a pro-rata basis i.e from (upto) the date on which asset is ready for use (disposed of).

Derecognition

An item of property, plant and equipment is derecognised upon disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected from its use and disposal. Any gain or loss arising on derecognition of the asset is measured as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset and is recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

d. Intangible assets

Acquired Intangible

Intangible assets that are acquired by the Group are measured initially at cost. Cost of an item of Intangible

asset comprises its purchase price, including import duties and non-refundable purchase taxes, after deducting trade discounts and rebates, any directly attributable cost of bringing the item to its working condition for its intended use. After initial recognition, an intangible asset is carried at its cost less any accumulated amortisation and any accumulated impairment loss.

Amortisation

Amortisation is calculated to write off the cost of intangible assets over their estimated useful lives using the straight-line method and is included in depreciation and amortisation expense in statement of profit and loss. The estimated useful life of Computer Software (ERP), Business Intelligence software Application and Website is 6 years.

Amortisation method, useful life and residual values are reviewed at the end of each financial year and adjusted if appropriate.

Intangible assets with indefinite useful lives such as Brands are not amortised, but are tested for impairment annually. The assessment of indefinite life is reviewed annually to determine whether the indefinite life continues to be supportable. If not, the change in useful life from indefinite to finite is made on a prospective basis.

Derecognition

Intangible assets are derecognised on disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected from its use and disposal. Any gain or loss arising upon derecognition of the asset (calculated as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset) is included in the statement of profit and loss when the asset is derecognised.

Research and development costs

Research costs are expensed as incurred. Development expenditures on an individual project are recognised as an intangible asset when the Company can demonstrate:

- The technical feasibility of completing the intangible asset so that the asset will be available for use or sale
- Its intention to complete and its ability and intention to use or sell the asset
- How the asset will generate future economic benefits
- The availability of resources to complete the asset

The ability to measure reliably the expenditure during development

Following initial recognition of the development expenditure as an asset, the asset is carried at cost less any accumulated amortisation and accumulated impairment losses. Amortisation of the asset begins when development is complete, and the asset is available for use. It is amortised

over the period of expected future benefit. Amortisation expense is recognised in the statement of profit and loss unless such expenditure forms part of carrying value of another asset. During the period of development, the asset is tested for impairment annually.

e. Inventories

Inventories is valued at cost or net realisable value, whichever is lower. Cost is determined using the specific identification method and included all costs incurred in bringing the inventories to their present location and condition, including non-recoverable duties and taxes. Net realisable value represented the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business, less the estimated costs necessary to make the sale. The comparison between cost and net realisable value was performed on an item-by-item basis.

During the year ended March 31, 2025, the Company had changed its method of inventory valuation from the weighted average cost method to the specific identification method with effect from June 1, 2024, to ensure consistency with the system implementation date relating to inventory tracking and valuation. Accordingly, inventories purchased on or after this date were valued on an item-by-item basis. This change was made considering the nature of the Company's business in high-value luxury goods with unique identifiers, where the specific identification method provided more reliable and relevant information.

Based on management's assessment, the aforesaid change in accounting policy did not have a material impact on the financial statements for the year ended March 31, 2025 and was also not material for the previous year.

f. Retirement and other employee benefits

Short-term employee benefits

Short-term employee benefit obligations are measured on an undiscounted basis and are expensed as the related service is provided. A liability is recognised for the amount expected to be paid e.g., salaries and wages, short term compensated absences and bonus etc., if the Group has a present legal or constructive obligation to pay this amount as a result of past service provided by the employee, and the amount of obligation can be estimated reliably.

Post-employment benefits

Defined contribution plans

A defined contribution plan is a post-employment benefit plan under which an entity pays specified contributions to a separate entity and will have no legal or constructive obligation to pay further amounts. The Group makes specified monthly contributions towards employee provident fund and employee state insurance scheme ('ESI') to Government administered scheme which is a defined contribution plan. The Group's contribution is recognised as an expense in the Statement of Profit and

Loss during the period in which the employee renders the related service.

Defined benefit plans

A defined benefit plan is a post-employment benefit plan other than a defined contribution plan. Gratuity is a defined benefit plan. The administration of the gratuity scheme has been entrusted to the Life Insurance Corporation of India ('LIC'). The Group's net obligation in respect of gratuity is calculated separately by estimating the amount of future benefit that employees have earned in the current and prior periods, discounting that amount and deducting the fair value of any plan assets.

The calculation of defined benefit obligation is performed annually by a qualified actuary using the projected unit credit method.

Re-measurements of the net defined benefit liability i.e. Gratuity, which comprise actuarial gains and losses are recognised in Other Comprehensive Income (OCI). Remeasurements are not reclassified to profit or loss in subsequent periods. The Group determines the net interest expense (income) on the net defined benefit liability for the period by applying the discount rate used to measure the defined benefit obligation at the beginning of the annual period to the then- net defined benefit liability, taking into account any changes in the net defined benefit liability during the period as a result of contributions and benefit payments. Net interest expense and other expenses related to defined benefit plans are recognised in the Statement of Profit or Loss.

When the benefits of a plan are changed or when a plan is curtailed, the resulting change in benefit that relates to past service ('past service cost' or 'past service gain') or the gain or loss on curtailment is recognised immediately in the statement of profit or loss. The Group recognises gains and losses on the settlement of a defined benefit plan when the settlement occurs.

Compensated absences

The Group's net obligation in respect of long-term employee benefits other than post-employment benefits is the amount of future benefit that employees have earned in return for their service in the current and prior periods; that benefit is discounted to determine its present value, and the fair value of any related assets is deducted. Such obligation such as those related to compensate absences is measured on the basis of an annual independent actuarial valuation using the projected unit cost credit method. Remeasurements gains or losses are recognised in profit or loss in the period in which they arise. The Group presents the leave liability as a current liability in the balance sheet; to the extent it does not have an unconditional right to defer

its settlement for 12 months after the reporting date. Where Group has the unconditional legal and contractual right to defer the settlement for a period beyond 12 months, the same is presented as non-current liability.

g. Provisions

A provision is recognised if, as a result of a past event, the Group has a present legal or constructive obligation that can be estimated reliably, and it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation. Provisions are determined by discounting the expected future cash flows (representing the best estimate of the expenditure required to settle the present obligation at the balance sheet date) at a pre-tax rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the liability. The unwinding of the discount is recognised as finance cost. Expected future losses are not provided for.

h. Financial guarantee contracts

Financial guarantee contracts are recognised as a deemed equity contribution if no premium was paid when guarantee is received. Deemed equity contribution is initially measured at fair value.

The fair value of financial guarantees is determined as the present value of the difference in net cash flows between the contractual payments under the debt instrument and the payments that would be required without the guarantee, or the estimated amount that would be payable to a third party for assuming the obligations.

i. Contingent liabilities and contingent assets

A contingent liability exists when there is a possible but not probable obligation, or a present obligation that may, but probably will not, require an outflow of resources, or a present obligation whose amount cannot be estimated reliably. Contingent liabilities do not warrant provisions, but are disclosed unless the possibility of outflow of resources is remote.

Contingent assets usually arise from unplanned or other unexpected events that give rise to the possibility of an inflow of economic benefits to the entity. Contingent assets are recognized when the realisation of income is virtually certain, then the related asset is not a contingent asset and its recognition is appropriate.

A contingent asset is disclosed where an inflow of economic benefits is probable.

j. Commitments

Commitments include the amount of purchase order (net of advances) issued to parties for completion of assets. Provisions, contingent liabilities, contingent assets and commitments are reviewed at each reporting date.

k. Revenue from contract with customers

The Group earns revenue primarily from retail trading of premium and luxury watches, accessories and other luxury items, marketing and support services and rendering of related after sale services. The Group has concluded that it is the principal in its revenue arrangement because it typically controls goods or services before transferring them to the customers.

Revenue is recognized upon transfer of control of promised products sold or services to customers in an amount that reflects the consideration the Group expects to receive in exchange for those products or services.

At contract inception, the Group assesses its promise to transfer products or services to a customer to identify separate performance obligations. The Group applies judgement to determine whether each product or services promised to a customer are capable of being distinct, and are distinct in the context of the contract, if not, the promised product or services are combined and accounted as a single performance obligation. The Group allocates the arrangement consideration to separately identifiable performance obligation based on their relative stand-alone selling price or residual method. Stand-alone selling prices are determined based on sale prices for the components when it is regularly sold separately, in cases where the Group is unable to determine the stand-alone selling price the Group uses third-party prices for similar deliverables or the Group uses expected cost plus margin approach in estimating the stand-alone selling price.

The method for recognizing revenues and costs depends on the nature of the products sold and services rendered.

Sale of goods

Revenue on sale of goods are recognized when the customer obtains control of the specified asset. The Group considers whether there are other promises in the contract that are separate performance obligations to which a portion of the transaction price needs to be allocated (e.g. customer loyalty points).

Variable Consideration

If the consideration in a contract includes the variable amount, the Group estimates the amount of consideration to which it will be entitled in exchange for transferring the goods to the customer. The variable consideration is estimated at contract inception and constrained until it is highly probable that a significant revenue reversal in the amount of cumulative revenue recognised will not occur when the associated uncertainty with the variable consideration is subsequently resolved. Some contracts for the sale of goods provide the customers with a right of return the goods within a specified period.

The Group uses the expected value method to estimate the variable consideration given the large number of contracts that have similar characteristics. The Group then applies the requirements on constraining estimates of variable consideration in order to determine the amount of variable consideration that can be included in the transaction price. A refund liability is recognized for the goods that are expected to be returned (i.e., the amount not included in the transaction price). A right of return asset (and corresponding adjustment to cost of sales) is also recognised for the right to recover the goods from a customer.

Right of return assets

A right-of-return asset is recognised for the right to recover the goods expected to be returned by customers. The asset is measured at the former carrying amount of the inventory, less any expected costs to recover the goods and any potential decreases in value. The Group updates the measurement of the asset recorded for any revisions to its expected level of returns, as well as any additional decreases in the value of the returned products.

Refund liabilities

A refund liability is recognised for the obligation to refund some or all of the consideration received (or receivable) from the customer. The Group's refund liabilities arise from customers' right of return. The Group updates its estimates of refund liabilities (and the corresponding change in the transaction price) at the end of each reporting period.

Customer loyalty programmes

For customer loyalty programmes, the transaction price in respect of initial sale is allocated between the award credits and the other components of the sale. The amount allocated to award credits is deferred and is recognised as revenue when the award credits are redeemed and the Group has fulfilled its obligations to supply the discounted products under the terms of the programme or when it is no longer probable that the award credits will be redeemed.

Sale of services

Revenue from services rendered is recognised in profit or loss as they are rendered based on agreements/ arrangements with the concerned parties, and recognised net of goods and services tax/ applicable taxes at the time of completion of service.

Contract balances

Trade Receivable

A receivable is recognised if an amount of consideration that is unconditional (i.e., only the passage of time is required before payment of the consideration is due). Refer to accounting policies of financial assets in Section of Financial instruments – initial recognition and subsequent measurement.

Contract liabilities

A contract liability is recognised if a payment is received or a payment is due (whichever is earlier) from a customer before the Group transfers the related goods or services. Contract liabilities are recognised as revenue when the Group performs under the contract (i.e., transfers control of the related goods or services to the customer).

i. Recognition of interest income or expense

Interest income or expense is recognised using the effective interest method.

The 'effective interest rate' is the rate that exactly discounts the estimated future cash payments or receipts through the expected life of the financial instrument to:

- The gross carrying amount of the financial asset; or
- The amortised cost of the financial liability.

In calculating interest income and expense, the effective interest rate is applied to the gross carrying amount of the asset (when the asset is not credit-impaired) or to the amortised cost of the liability. However, for financial assets that have become credit-impaired subsequent to initial recognition, interest income is calculated by applying the effective interest rate to the amortised cost of the financial asset. If the asset is no longer credit-impaired, then the calculation of interest income reverts to the gross basis.

m. Borrowing costs

Borrowing costs are interest and other costs (including exchange differences arising from foreign currency borrowings to the extent that they are regarded as an adjustment to interest costs) incurred by the Group in connection with the borrowing of funds. Borrowing costs directly attributable to acquisition or construction of an asset which necessarily take a substantial period of time to get ready for their intended use are capitalized as a part of cost of the asset. Other borrowing costs are recognised as an expense in the period in which they are incurred. Borrowing cost also includes exchange differences to the extent regarded as an adjustment to the borrowing costs.

n. Taxes

Income tax expenses comprises of current and deferred tax. It is recognised in profit or loss except to the extent that it relates to a business combination or an item recognised directly in equity or in other comprehensive income.

Current tax

Current tax comprises the expected tax payable or receivable on the taxable income or loss for the year and any adjustment to the tax payable or receivable in respect of previous years. The amount of current tax reflects the best estimate of the tax amount expected to be paid or received after considering the uncertainty, if any, related to

income taxes. It is measured using tax rates (and tax laws) enacted or substantively enacted by the reporting date.

Current tax assets and current tax liabilities are offset only if there is a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts, and it is intended to realise the asset and settle the liability on a net basis or simultaneously.

Current income tax relating to items recognized outside profit or loss is recognized outside profit or loss (either in other comprehensive income (OCI) or in equity). Current tax items are recognized in correlation to the underlying transaction either in OCI or directly in equity. Management periodically evaluates positions taken in the tax returns with respect to situations in which applicable tax regulations are subject to interpretation and considers whether it is probable that a taxation authority will accept an uncertain tax treatment. The Group shall reflect the effect of uncertainty for each uncertain tax treatment by using either most likely method or expected value method, depending on which method predicts better resolution of the treatment.

Deferred tax

Deferred tax is provided using the liability method on temporary differences between the carrying amounts of the assets and liabilities for financial reporting purposes and the corresponding amounts used for taxation purposes.

Deferred tax liabilities are recognized for all temporary differences, except when the deferred tax liability arises from the initial recognition of goodwill or an asset or liability in a transaction that is not a business combination and, at the time of the transaction, affects neither the accounting profit nor taxable profit or loss and does not give rise to equal taxable and deductible temporary differences and in respect of taxable temporary differences associated with investments in subsidiaries, associates and interests in joint ventures, when the timing of the reversal of the temporary differences can be controlled and it is probable that the temporary differences will not reverse in the foreseeable future.

Deferred tax assets are recognised for all deductible temporary differences, the carry forward of unused tax credits and any unused tax losses. Deferred tax assets are recognised to the extent that it is probable that taxable profit will be available against which the deductible temporary differences, and the carry forward of unused tax credits and unused tax losses can be utilised, except when the deferred tax asset relating to the deductible temporary difference arises from the initial recognition of an asset or liability in a transaction that is not a business combination and, at the time of the transaction, affects neither the accounting profit nor taxable profit or loss and does not give rise to equal taxable and deductible temporary differences and in respect of deductible temporary differences associated with investments in subsidiaries, associates and interests in joint ventures deferred tax assets are recognised only to

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the extent that it is probable that the temporary differences will reverse in the foreseeable future and taxable profit will be available against which the temporary differences can be utilized.

The carrying amount of deferred tax assets is reviewed at each reporting date and reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that sufficient taxable profit will be available to allow all or part of the deferred tax asset to be utilised. Unrecognised deferred tax assets are re-assessed at each reporting date and are recognised to the extent that it has become probable that future taxable profits will allow the deferred tax asset to be recovered.

In assessing the recoverability of deferred tax assets, the Group relies on the same forecast assumptions used elsewhere in the consolidated financial statements and in other management reports, which, among other things, reflect the potential impact of climate-related development on the business, such as increased cost of production as a result of measures to reduce carbon emission.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are measured at the tax rates that are expected to apply in the year when the asset is realized or the liability is settled, based on tax rates (and tax laws) that have been enacted or substantively enacted at the reporting date.

Deferred tax relating to items recognised outside profit or loss is recognised outside profit or loss (either in other comprehensive income or in equity). Deferred tax items are recognised in correlation to the underlying transaction either in OCI or directly in equity.

Tax benefits acquired as part of a business combination, but not satisfying the criteria for separate recognition at that date, are recognised subsequently if new information about facts and circumstances change. Acquired deferred tax benefits recognised within the measurement period reduce goodwill related to that acquisition if they result from new information obtained about facts and circumstances existing at the acquisition date. If the carrying amount of goodwill is zero, any remaining deferred tax benefits are recognised in OCI/ capital reserve depending on the principle explained for bargain purchase gains. All other acquired tax benefits realised are recognised in profit or loss.

The Group offsets deferred tax assets and deferred tax liabilities if and only if it has a legally enforceable right to set off current tax liabilities and assets and the deferred tax assets and deferred tax liabilities relate to income taxes levied by the same taxation authorities.

Sales tax/Goods and Service Tax (GST) paid on acquisition of assets or on incurring expenses

Expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of sales tax / GST paid, except:

- When the tax incurred on a purchase of assets or services is not recoverable from the taxation authority, in which case, the tax paid is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of the expense item, as applicable.
- When receivables and payables are stated with the amount of tax included.

The net amount of tax recoverable from, or payable to, the taxation authority is included as part of receivables or payables in the balance sheet.

o. Leases

The group assesses at contract inception whether a contract is, or contains, a lease. That is, if the contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset for a period of time in exchange for consideration.

Group as a lessee

The Group applies a single recognition and measurement approach for all leases, except for short-term leases and leases of low-value assets. The Group recognises lease liabilities to make lease payments and right-of-use assets representing the right to use the underlying assets.

Right-of-use assets

The Group recognizes right-of-use assets at the commencement date of the lease (i.e., the date the underlying asset is available for use). Right-of-use assets are measured at cost, less any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses, and adjusted for any remeasurement of lease liabilities. The cost of right-of-use assets includes the amount of lease liabilities recognised, initial direct costs incurred, and lease payments made at or before the commencement date less any lease incentives received. Right-of-use assets are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the shorter of the lease term and the estimated useful lives of the assets, as follows:

- Buildings 2 to 10 years
- Furniture 4 to 10 years

If ownership of the leased asset transfers to the Group at the end of the lease term or the cost reflects the exercise of a purchase option, depreciation is calculated using the estimated useful life of the asset.

The right-of-use assets are also subject to impairment. Refer to the accounting policies in Section (s) Impairment of non-financial assets.

Lease Liabilities

At the commencement date of the lease, the Group recognises lease liabilities measured at the present value of lease payments to be made over the lease term. The lease payments include fixed payments (including in substance

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fixed payments) less any lease incentives receivable, variable lease payments that depend on an index or a rate, and amounts expected to be paid under residual value guarantees. The lease payments also include the exercise price of a purchase option reasonably certain to be exercised by the Group and payments of penalties for terminating the lease, if the lease term reflects the Group exercising the option to terminate. Variable lease payments that do not depend on an index or a rate are recognised as expenses (unless they are incurred to produce inventories) in the period in which the event or condition that triggers the payment occurs.

In calculating the present value of lease payments, the Group uses its incremental borrowing rate at the lease commencement date because the interest rate implicit in the lease is not readily determinable. After the commencement date, the amount of lease liabilities is increased to reflect the accretion of interest and reduced for the lease payments made. In addition, the carrying amount of lease liabilities is remeasured if there is a modification, a change in the lease term, a change in the lease payments (e.g., changes to future payments resulting from a change in an index or rate used to determine such lease payments) or a change in the assessment of an option to purchase the underlying asset.

Short-term leases and leases of low-value assets

The Group applies the short-term lease recognition exemption to its short-term leases of machinery and equipment (i.e., those leases that have a lease term of 12 months or less from the commencement date and do not contain a purchase option). It also applies the lease of low-value assets recognition exemption to leases of office equipment that are considered to be low value. Lease payments on short-term leases and leases of low-value assets are recognised as expense on a straight-line basis over the lease term. Lease payments on short-term leases and leases of low-value assets are recognised as expense on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

p. Financial instruments

A Financial instrument is any contract that gives rise to a financial asset of one entity and a financial liability or equity instrument of another entity.

Financial assets

Initial recognition and measurement

Financial assets are classified, at initial recognition, as subsequently measured at amortised cost, fair value through other comprehensive income (OCI), and fair value through profit or loss. The classification of financial assets at initial recognition depends on the financial asset's contractual cash flow characteristics and the Group's business model for managing them. With the exception of trade receivables that do not contain a significant financing component or

for which the Group has applied the practical expedient, all financial assets are recognised initially at fair value plus, in the case of financial assets not recorded at fair value through profit or loss, transaction costs that are attributable to the acquisition of the financial asset. Trade receivables that do not contain a significant financing component or for which the Group has applied the practical expedient are measured at the transaction price determined under Ind AS 115. Refer to the accounting policies in section of Revenue from contracts with customers. In order for a financial asset to be classified and measured at amortised cost or fair value through OCI, it needs to give rise to cash flows that are 'solely payments of principal and interest (SPPI)' on the principal amount outstanding. This assessment is referred to as the SPPI test and is performed at an instrument level. Financial assets with cash flows that are not SPPI are classified and measured at fair value through profit or loss, irrespective of the business model.

The Group's business model for managing financial assets refers to how it manages its financial assets in order to generate cash flows. The business model determines whether cash flows will result from collecting contractual cash flows, selling the financial assets, or both. Financial assets classified and measured at amortised cost are held within a business model with the objective to hold financial assets in order to collect contractual cash flows while financial assets classified and measured at fair value through OCI are held within a business model with the objective of both holding to collect contractual cash flows and selling.

Purchases or sales of financial assets that require delivery of assets within a time frame established by regulation or convention in the market place (regular way trades) are recognised on the trade date, i.e., the date that the Group commits to purchase or sell the asset.

Subsequent measurement

For purposes of subsequent measurement, financial assets are classified in four categories:

- Debt instruments at amortised cost
- Debt instruments at fair value through other comprehensive income (FVOCI)
- Debt instruments, derivatives and equity instruments at fair value through profit or loss (FVTPL)
- Equity instruments designated at fair value through other comprehensive income (FVOCI)

Debt instruments at amortised cost

A 'debt instrument' is measured at the amortised cost if the asset is held within a business model whose objective is to hold assets for collecting contractual cash flows, and contractual terms of the asset give rise on specified dates to

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cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest (SPPI) on the principal amount outstanding.

After initial measurement, such financial assets are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest rate (EIR) method. The effective interest rate is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash payments or receipts through the expected life of the financial instrument to the gross carrying amount of the financial asset or the amortised cost of the financial liability. Amortised cost is calculated by taking into account any discount or premium on acquisition and fees or costs that are an integral part of the EIR. The EIR amortisation is included in other income in the Statement of Profit and Loss. The losses arising from impairment are recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

Debt instrument at FVOCI

A 'debt instrument' is classified as at the FVOCI if the objective of the business model is achieved both by collecting contractual cash flows and selling the financial assets, and the asset's contractual cash flows represent SPPI.

Debt instruments included within the FVOCI category are measured initially as well as at each reporting date at fair value. Fair value movements are recognised in the other comprehensive income (OCI). On derecognition of the asset, cumulative gain or loss previously recognised in OCI is reclassified to the Statement of Profit and Loss. Interest earned whilst holding FVOCI debt instrument is reported as interest income using the EIR method.

Debt instrument at FVTPL

FVTPL is a residual category for debt instruments. Any debt instrument, which does not meet the criteria for categorization as at amortised cost or as FVOCI, is classified as at FVTPL. In addition, at initial recognition, the Group may irrevocably elect to designate a debt instrument, which otherwise meets amortised cost or FVOCI criteria, as at FVTPL. However, such adoption is allowed only if doing so reduces or eliminates a measurement or recognition inconsistency (referred to as 'accounting mismatch').

Debt instruments included within the FVTPL category are measured at fair value with all changes recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

Equity investments

All equity investments in scope of Ind AS 109 are measured at fair value. Equity instruments which are held for trading and contingent consideration recognised by an acquirer in a business combination to which Ind AS 103 applies are classified as at FVTPL. For all other equity instruments, the Group may make an irrevocable adoption to present subsequent changes in the fair value under other comprehensive income. The Group makes such adoption

on an instrument-by-instrument basis. The classification is made on initial recognition and is irrevocable.

If the Group decides to classify an equity instrument as at FVOCI, then all fair value changes on the instrument, excluding dividends, are recognised in the OCI. There is no recycling of the amounts from OCI to the Profit or Loss, even on sale of investment. However, the Group may transfer the cumulative gain or loss to retained earnings.

Equity instruments included within the FVTPL category are measured at fair value with all changes recognised in the Profit or Loss.

Impairment of financial assets

The Group recognises loss allowances for expected credit loss on financial assets measured at amortised cost. At each reporting date, the Group assesses whether financial assets carried at amortised cost are credit-impaired. A financial asset is 'credit-impaired' when one or more events that have detrimental impact on the estimated future cash flows of the financial assets have occurred.

Evidence that the financial asset is credit-impaired includes the following observable data:

- significant financial difficulty of the borrower or issuer;
- the breach of contract such as a default or being past due for 180 days or more;
- the restructuring of a loan or advance by the Group on terms that the Group would not consider otherwise;
- it is probable that the borrower will enter bankruptcy or other financial re-organisation; or
- the disappearance of active market for a security because of financial difficulties.

The impairment methodology of the Group depends on whether there has been a significant increase in credit risk since initial recognition. If credit risk has not increased significantly, twelve month expected credit loss is used to provide for impairment loss, otherwise lifetime expected credit loss is used.

However, only in case of trade receivables, the Group applies the simplified approach which requires expected lifetime losses to be recognised from initial recognition of the receivables.

The presumption under Ind As 109 with reference to significant increases in credit risk since initial recognition (when financial assets are more than 30 days past due), has been rebutted and is not applicable to the Group, as the Group is able to collect a significant portion of its receivables that exceed the due date.

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Measurement of expected credit losses

Expected credit losses are a probability-weighted estimate of credit losses. Credit losses are measured as the present value of all cash shortfalls (i.e. difference between the cash flow due to the Group in accordance with the contract and the cash flow that the Group expects to receive).

Presentation of allowance for expected credit losses in the balance sheet

Loss allowance for financial assets measured at the amortised cost is deducted from the gross carrying amount of the assets.

Write-off

The gross carrying amount of a financial asset is written off (either partially or in full) to the extent that there is no realistic prospect of recovery. This is generally the case when the Group determines that the debtors do not have assets or sources of income that could generate sufficient cash flows to repay the amount subject to the write-off. However, financial assets that are written off could still be subject to enforcement activities in order to comply with the Group's procedure for recovery of amounts due.

Derecognition of financial assets

A financial asset (or, where applicable, a part of a financial asset or part of a group of similar financial assets) is primarily derecognized (i.e., removed from the Group's balance sheet) when:

- The rights to receive cash flows from the asset have expired, or
- The Group has transferred its rights to receive cash flows from the asset or has assumed an obligation to pay the received cash flows in full without material delay to a third party under a 'pass-through' arrangement; and either (a) the Group has transferred substantially all the risks and rewards of the asset, or (b) the Group has neither transferred nor retained substantially all the risks and rewards of the asset, but has transferred control of the asset.

When the Group has transferred its rights to receive cash flows from an asset or has entered into a pass-through arrangement, it evaluates if and to what extent it has retained the risks and rewards of ownership. When it has neither transferred nor retained substantially all of the risks and rewards of the asset, nor transferred control of the asset, the Group continues to recognise the transferred asset to the extent of the Group's continuing involvement. In that case, the Group also recognises an associated liability. The transferred asset and the associated liability are measured on a basis that reflects the rights and obligations that the Group has retained.

Financial liabilities

Initial recognition and measurement

Financial liabilities are classified, at initial recognition, as financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss, loans and borrowings, payables as appropriate.

All financial liabilities are recognised initially at fair value and, in the case of loans and borrowings and payables, net of directly attributable transaction costs.

The Group's financial liabilities include trade and other payables, loans and borrowings including bank overdrafts, financial guarantee contracts and derivative financial instruments.

The Group holds Derivative financial instruments are initially recognized at fair value on the date the contract is entered into and are subsequently remeasured at fair value at each reporting date. All derivatives are classified as held for trading and are accounted for at fair value through profit or loss (FVTPL), unless they are designated and effective as hedging instruments.

Subsequent measurement

For purposes of subsequent measurement, financial liabilities are classified in two categories:

- Financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss (FVTPL)
- Financial liabilities at amortised cost (loans and borrowings)

A financial liability is classified as at FVTPL if it is classified as held-for-trading, or it is a derivative or it is designated as such on initial recognition. Financial liabilities at FVTPL are measured at fair value and net gains and losses, including any interest expense, are recognised in Statement of Profit and Loss.

Other financial liabilities are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Interest expense and foreign exchange gains and losses are recognised in Statement of Profit and Loss. Any gain or loss on derecognition is also recognised in Statement of Profit and Loss.

Derecognition of financial liabilities

A financial liability is derecognised when the obligation under the liability is discharged or cancelled or expires. When an existing financial liability is replaced by another from the same lender on substantially different terms, or the terms of an existing liability are substantially modified, such an exchange or modification is treated as the derecognition of the original liability and the recognition of a new liability. The difference in the respective carrying amounts is recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

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Offsetting

Financial assets and financial liabilities are offset and the net amount presented in the Balance Sheet when, and only when, the Group currently has a legally enforceable right to set off the amounts and it intends either to settle them on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

q. Impairment of non-financial assets

The Group's non-financial assets, are reviewed at each reporting date to determine if there is indication of any impairment. If any such indication exists, then the asset's recoverable amount is estimated. For impairment testing, assets that do not generate independent cash flows are grouped together into cash generating units (CGUs). Each CGU represents the smallest group of assets that generate cash inflows that are largely independent of the cash inflows of other assets or CGUs.

The recoverable amount of as CGU (or an individual asset) is the higher of its value in use and fair value less cost to sell. Value in use is based on the estimated future cash flows, discounted to their present value using a pre-tax discount rate that reflects current assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the CGU (or the asset).

The Group's corporate assets (e.g., central office building for providing support to various CGUs) do not generate independent cash inflows. To determine impairment of a corporate asset, recoverable amount is determined for the CGUs to which the corporate asset belongs.

An impairment loss is recognised whenever the carrying amount of an asset or its cash generating unit exceeds its recoverable amount. Impairment losses are recognised in statement of profit or loss. An impairment loss is reversed if there has been a change in the estimates used to determine the recoverable amount. Such a reversal is made only to the extent that the asset's carrying amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined net of depreciation or amortisation, if no impairment loss had been recognised.

r. Foreign currency transactions

Initial recognition

Transactions in foreign currencies are initially recorded by the Group's entities at their respective functional currency spot rates at the date the transaction first qualifies for recognition. However, for practical reasons, the Group uses average rate if the average approximates the actual rate at the date of the transaction.

Measurement at the reporting date

Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated into the functional currency at the exchange rate at the reporting date. Exchange differences arising on settlement or translation of monetary items are

recognised in statement of profit and loss with the exception of the following:

- Exchange differences arising on monetary items that forms part of a reporting entity's net investment in a foreign operation are recognised in profit or loss in the separate financial statements of the reporting entity or the individual financial statements of the foreign operation, as appropriate. In the financial statements that include the foreign operation and the reporting entity (e.g., consolidated financial statements when the foreign operation is a subsidiary), such exchange differences are recognised initially in OCI. These exchange differences are reclassified from equity to profit or loss on disposal of the net investment.
- Exchange differences arising on monetary items that are designated as part of the hedge of the Group's net investment of a foreign operation. These are recognised in OCI until the net investment is disposed of, at which time, the cumulative amount is reclassified to profit or loss.
- Tax charges and credits attributable to exchange differences on those monetary items are also recorded in OCI.

Non-monetary assets and liabilities that are measured at fair value in a foreign currency are translated into the functional currency at the exchange rate when the fair value was determined. Non-monetary assets and liabilities that are measured based on historical cost in a foreign currency are translated at the exchange rate at the date of the initial transaction. The gain or loss arising on translation of non-monetary items measured at fair value is treated in line with the recognition of the gain or loss on the change in fair value of the item (i.e., translation differences on items whose fair value gain or loss is recognised in OCI or profit or loss are also recognised in OCI or profit or loss, respectively).

s. Operating segments

An operating segment is a component of the Group that engages in business activities from which it may earn revenues and incur expenses, including revenues and expenses that relate to transactions with any of the Group's other components, and for which discrete financial information is available. All operating segments' operating results are reviewed regularly by the Group's Chief Executive Officer/Managing Director as Chief Operating Decision Maker (CODM) to make decisions about resources to be allocated to the segments and assess their performance.

t. Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalent in the balance sheet comprise cash at banks and on hand and short-term deposits with an original maturity of three months or less, that are readily convertible to a known amount of cash and subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

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For the purpose of the statement of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents consist of cash and short-term deposits, as defined above, net of outstanding bank overdrafts as they are considered an integral part of the Group's cash management.

u. Cash flow statement

Cash flows are reported using the indirect method, whereby profit for the period is adjusted for the effects of transactions of a non-cash nature, any deferrals or accruals of past or future operating cash receipts or payments and item of income or expenses associated with investing or financing cash flows. The cash flows from operating, investing and financing activities of the Group are segregated.

v. Earnings per share

Basic earnings/ (loss) per share are calculated by dividing the net profit/ (loss) for the year attributable to equity shareholders of the parent by the weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the year. The weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the year is adjusted for events of bonus issue and share split. For the purpose of calculating diluted earnings/ (loss) per share, the net profit or loss for the year attributable to equity shareholders and the weighted average number of shares outstanding during the year are adjusted for the effects of all dilutive potential equity shares.

w. Measurement of fair values

The Group measures financial instruments, such as, derivatives at fair value at each balance sheet date.

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The fair value measurement is based on the presumption that the transaction to sell the asset or transfer the liability takes place either:

- In the principal market for the asset or liability, or
- In the absence of a principal market, in the most advantageous market for the asset or liability

The principal or the most advantageous market must be accessible by the Group.

The fair value of an asset or a liability is measured using the assumptions that market participants would use when pricing the asset or liability, assuming that market participants act in their economic best interest.

A fair value measurement of a non-financial asset takes into account a market participant's ability to generate economic benefits by using the asset in its highest and best use or by selling it to another market participant that would use the asset in its highest and best use.

The Group uses valuation techniques that are appropriate in the circumstances and for which sufficient data are available to measure fair value, maximising the use of relevant observable inputs and minimising the use of unobservable inputs.

All assets and liabilities for which fair value is measured or disclosed in the financial statements are categorised within the fair value hierarchy, described as follows, based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement as a whole:

- Level 1 — Quoted (unadjusted) market prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities
- Level 2 — Valuation techniques for which the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement is directly or indirectly observable
- Level 3 — Valuation techniques for which the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement is unobservable

For assets and liabilities that are recognised in the consolidated financial statements on a recurring basis, the Group determines whether transfers have occurred between levels in the hierarchy by re-assessing categorisation (based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement as a whole) at the end of each reporting period.

For the purpose of fair value disclosures, the Group has determined classes of assets and liabilities on the basis of the nature, characteristics and risks of the asset or liability and the level of the fair value hierarchy as explained above.

Further information about the assumptions made in measuring fair values used in preparing these consolidated financial statements is included in the respective notes.

2.4 Changes in accounting policies and disclosures

New and amended standards

I. Ind AS 1 (Presentation of Financial Statements): Classification of Liabilities: Clarifies that liabilities are classified as current/non-current based on rights existing at the reporting date, replacing "unconditional right" with "substantive right" to defer settlement.

Covenants: Enhanced disclosures are required for covenants that must be met within 12 months, specifically how entities manage the risk of breaching those covenants.

The Company has reviewed the new pronouncements and based on its evaluation it has determined that it does not have any impact on its financial statements

II. Ind AS 7 & Ind AS 107 (Cash Flows & Financial Instruments): Supplier Finance Arrangements: Companies must provide detailed disclosures on supplier finance arrangements

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(reverse factoring), including terms, outstanding balances, and liquidity risk, to improve transparency.

The Company has reviewed the new pronouncements and based on its evaluation has determined that it does not have any impact on its financial statements

- III.** Ind AS 12 (Income Taxes - Pillar Two): Global Minimum Tax: Introduces a temporary exception to deferred tax accounting related to Pillar Two model rules. It requires new disclosures about exposure to this tax, which treats top-up taxes as current tax expenses

- IV.** Ind AS 21 (Effects of Changes in Foreign Exchange Rates): Lack of Exchangeability: Provides guidance on assessing when a currency is exchangeable and how to determine the spot rate when it is not.

2.5 Significant accounting judgements, estimates and assumptions

The preparation of the Group's consolidated financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of revenues, expenses, assets and liabilities, and the accompanying disclosures, and the disclosure of contingent liabilities. Uncertainty about these assumptions and estimates could result in outcomes that require a material adjustment to the carrying amount of assets or liabilities affected in future periods.

Judgments

Information about judgments made in applying accounting policies that have the most significant effects on the amounts recognised in the consolidated financial statements is included in the following notes:

- Note 2.3(c) – Assessment of useful life of Property, plant and equipment
- Note 2.3(d) – Assessment of useful life of Intangible assets
- Note 2.3 (g) and (i) – Provisions and contingent liabilities
- Note 2.3 (n) – Income taxes

Assumptions and estimation uncertainties

Information about assumptions and estimation uncertainties that have a significant risk of resulting in a material adjustment in the year ended March 31, 2026 is included in the following notes:

a) Defined benefit plans

The present value of the gratuity is determined using actuarial valuations. An actuarial valuation involves making various assumptions that may differ from actual developments in the future. These include the determination of the discount rate, future salary increases and mortality rates. Due to the complexities involved in the valuation and its long-term nature, a defined benefit obligation is highly sensitive to changes in these assumptions. All assumptions are reviewed at each reporting date.

The parameter most subject to change is the discount rate. In determining the appropriate discount rate for plans operated in India, the management considers the interest rates of government bonds in currencies consistent with the currencies of the post-employment benefit obligation. The mortality rate is based on publicly available mortality tables for the specific countries. Those mortality tables tend to change only at interval in response to demographic changes. Future salary increases, and gratuity increases are based on expected future inflation rates for the respective countries.

b) Taxes

Uncertainties exist with respect to the interpretation of complex tax regulations, changes in tax laws, and the amount and timing of future taxable income. Given the wide range of business relationships and the long term nature and complexity of existing contractual agreements, differences arising between the actual results and the assumptions made, or future changes to such assumptions, could necessitate future adjustments to tax income and expense already recorded. The Group establishes provisions, based on reasonable estimates. The amount of such provisions is based on various factors, such as experience of previous tax audits and differing interpretations of tax regulations by the taxable entity and the responsible tax authority. Such differences of interpretation may arise on a wide variety of issues depending on the conditions prevailing in the respective domicile of the companies.

c) Contingencies

Refer Note 36 – Recognition and measurement of provision and contingencies, key assumptions about the likelihood and magnitude of an outflow of resources;

d) Impairment of non-financial assets

Impairment exists when the carrying value of an asset or cash generating unit exceeds its recoverable amount, which is the higher of its fair value less costs of disposal and its value in use. The fair value less costs of disposal calculation is based on available data from binding sales transactions, conducted at arm's length, for similar assets or observable market prices less incremental costs for disposing of the asset. The value in use calculation is based on a DCF model.

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The cash flows are derived from the budget for the next five years and do not include restructuring activities that the Company is not yet committed to or significant future investments that will enhance the asset's performance of the CGU being tested. The recoverable amount is sensitive to the discount rate used for the DCF model as well as the expected future cash-inflows and the growth rate used for extrapolation purposes. These estimates are most relevant to goodwill and other intangibles with indefinite useful lives recognised by the Group.

- e) **Determining the lease term of contracts with renewal and termination options – Group as lessee:** The key assumptions concerning the future and other key sources of estimation uncertainty at the reporting date, that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year. The Group based its assumptions and estimates on parameters available when the financial statements were prepared. Existing circumstances and assumptions about future developments, however, may change due to market changes or circumstances arising that are beyond the control of the Group. Such changes are reflected in the assumptions when they occur.

Leases – Estimating the incremental borrowing rate:

The Group cannot readily determine the interest rate implicit in the lease, therefore, it uses its incremental borrowing rate (IBR) to measure lease liabilities. The IBR is the rate of interest that the Group would have to pay to borrow over a

similar term, and with a similar security, the funds necessary to obtain an asset of a similar value to the right-of-use asset in a similar economic environment. The IBR therefore reflects what the Group 'would have to pay', which requires estimation when no observable rates are available or when they need to be adjusted to reflect the terms and conditions of the lease. The Group estimates the IBR using observable inputs (such as market interest rates) when available and is required to make certain entity-specific estimates.

- f) **Useful life of Property, plant and equipment and intangibles:** The management estimates the useful life and residual value of property, plant and equipment and other intangible assets. These assumptions are reviewed at each reporting date.
- g) **Provision for slow and obsolete inventory:** The Parent Company is in business of trading of watches, accessories & luxury items and rendering of related after sale services and consists of inventory of watches at various stores of the Parent Company. The Parent Company on a periodic basis and at each reporting date assess the inventory age listing to identify slow-moving allowance and obsolete inventories and then estimates the amount of inventory provision. In doing so, it estimates the net realisable value of aged inventory based on current selling price of such/similar aged inventory and likely sales volume based discount offered and past sales trend. Also, the Parent Company reviews catalogues of various brands to verify whether all inventory items are appearing in them.

The total offer expenses in relation to the fresh issue were ₹ 379.02 (excluding taxes). Refer note 49.

(iv) Retained earnings

Retained earnings are the profit that the Group has earned till date, less dividends or other distributions paid to shareholders. Retained earnings includes re-measurement (loss) / gain on defined benefit plans, net of taxes that will not be reclassified to statement of profit and loss. Retained earnings is a free reserve available to the Group and eligible for distribution to shareholders, in case where it is having positive balance representing net earnings till date.

(v) Other comprehensive income

Other comprehensive income comprises actuarial gain / loss on remeasurement of defined benefit obligation and return on plan assets.

(vi) Exchange differences on translation of foreign operations

Exchange differences arising on translation of the foreign operations are recognised in other comprehensive income as described in accounting policy and accumulated in a separate reserve within equity. The cumulative amount is reclassified to profit or loss when the net investment is disposed-off.

II. Financial risk management

(i) Risk management framework

The Parent Company's risk management committee has overall responsibility for the establishment and oversight of the Group's risk management framework. The Group's risk management policies are established to identify and analyse the risk faced by the Group, to set appropriate risk limits and controls and to monitor risks and adherence to limits. Risk management policies and systems are reviewed regularly to effect changes in market conditions and Group's activities. The Group, through its training and management standards and procedures, aims to maintain discipline and constructive control environment in which all employees understand their roles and obligations. The Parent Company's audit committee oversees how management monitors compliance with Group's risk management policies and procedures, and reviews the adequacy of the risk management framework in relation to risk faced by the Group. The audit committee is assisted in its oversight role by internal audit. Internal audit undertakes both regular and adhoc reviews of risk management controls and procedures, the result of which are reported to audit committee.

The Group has exposure to the following risks arising from financial instruments:

- Credit risk (see (ii));
- Liquidity risk (see (iii));and
- Market risk (see (iv))

(ii) Credit risk

Credit risk is the risk of financial loss to the Group if a customer or counterparty to a financial instrument fails to meet its contractual obligations. The carrying amount of financial assets represents the maximum credit risk exposure and arises principally from the Group's receivable from customers and loans.

Trade receivables and Loans

The Group's retail business is pre-dominantly on cash and carry basis which is largely through credit-card collections. The credit risk on such collections is minimal, since they are primarily owned by customers' card issuing banks. The Group has adopted a policy of dealing with only credit worthy counterparties in case of institutional customers and the credit risk exposure for institutional customers is managed by the Group by credit worthiness checks. The Group also carries credit risk on lease deposits with landlords for store properties taken on leases, for which agreements are signed and property possessions timely taken for store operations. The risk relating to refunds after store shut down is managed through successful negotiations or appropriate legal actions, where necessary. The Group's experience of delinquencies and customer disputes have been minimal. Further, trade and other receivables consist of a large number of customers, across geographies within India, hence, the Group is not exposed to concentration risks.

The Group holds cash and cash equivalents of ₹ 14,407.94 at March 31, 2026 (March 31, 2025: ₹2,848.01). The cash and cash equivalents are mainly held with scheduled banks.

(iii) Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Company will encounter difficulty in meeting the obligations associated with its financial liabilities that are settled by delivering cash or another financial assets. The Company's approach to manage liquidity is to have sufficient liquidity to meet its liabilities when they are due, under both normal and stressed circumstances, without incurring unacceptable losses or risking damage to the Company's reputation.

Management manages the liquidity risk by monitoring cash flow forecasts on a periodic basis and maturity profiles of financial assets and liabilities. This monitoring takes into account the accessibility of cash and cash equivalents and additional undrawn financing facilities. The Company will continue to consider various borrowings of leasing options to maximize liquidity and supplement cash requirements as necessary. Post completion of Initial Public Offer, the Company has repaid all working capital loans / limits and part of shareholder deposits and also, surrendered the sanctioned borrowing limits. During the year ended March 31, 2025, The Company was having sanctions of borrowing limits and no amount was drawn against the limits during the period. There is no sanction applicable in current financial year ended March 31, 2026.

(iv) Market Risk

a) Product price risk

In a potentially inflationary economy, the Group expects periodical price increases across its retail product lines. Product price increases which are not in line with the levels of customers' discretionary spends, may affect the business/retail sales volumes. Since the Group operates in premium and luxury watches category, the demand is reasonably inelastic to changes in price. However, the Group continually monitor and compares prices of its products in other developed markets as its customers tend to compare prices across markets. In the event that prices deviate significantly unfavourably from the markets, the Group negotiates with its vendor for change of prices. The Group also manages the risk by offering judicious product discounts to retail customers to sustain volumes. The Group negotiates with its vendors for purchase price rebates such that the rebates substantially absorb the product discounts offered to the retail customers. This helps the Group protect itself from significant product margin losses.

II. Defined benefit plan - Gratuity

The employees' gratuity fund scheme managed by Life Insurance Corporation of India is a defined benefit plan. The present value of obligation is determined based on actuarial valuation using the Projected Unit Credit Method, which recognises each period of service as giving rise to additional unit of employee benefit entitlement and measures each unit separately to build up the final obligation. The effect of these decrements on the defined benefit obligation is not straight forward and depends upon the combination of salary increase, discount rate and vesting criteria. It is important not to overstate withdrawals because in the financial analysis the retirement benefit of a short career employee typically costs less per year as compared to a long service employee.

- 52.** During the year ended March 26, the Company has incorporated Micron Watch Services Private Limited , a subsidiary of Ethos Limited, on 22nd August 2025 with Corporate Identification Number (CIN) U95294HR2025PTC135383 under the jurisdiction of the laws of India. The registered office of the Company is situated at 359, Udyog Vihar, Phase-II, DLF QE, Gurgaon, Haryana, India 122002. The C select Indian cities, focusing on watch service and repair. Ethos Limited owned 50,100 shares of ₹ 10 each out of total share capital of 1,00,000 shares of ₹ 10 each.

- 53.** The Group has used accounting software for maintaining its books of account which has a feature of recording audit trail (edit log) facility and the same has operated throughout the year for all relevant transactions recorded in the accounting software. Further, during the course of our audit, we did not identify any instance of the audit trail feature having been tampered with. Additionally, the audit trail has been preserved by the Company in accordance with the applicable statutory record-retention requirements.

- 54.** There are no significant events after reporting date which need to be disclosed.
